## STATE FARMERS INSTITUTE FEB. 18, 19, AND 20, 1920

Annual Sessions to be Held at Carbondale Promise to be Best Ever Held.

Carbondale, in the southern part of the State, will be the scene of the 1920 Institute of the Farmers of Illinois. The sessions will be held at the State Normal College there, February 18, 19 and 20, 1920 and delegates will be present from practically every county in Illinois.

In connection with the Institute the Department of Household Science will hold their annual convention and the evening programs will be joint ones between the two bodies.

The programs this year will be wonderful. Such men as Dean Dav- enport of the University of Illinois; Dr. George Bouyoucos of the Mich- igan Agricultural College; Bro. Leo of Notre Dame University; Dr. S. A. Forbes, State Entomologist of Ur- bana, being on the programs. On Thursday evening, February 19, Hon. Medill McCormick, U. S. Sen- ator from Illinois, will make an ad- dress at the joint meeting.

Delegates are not the only ones en- titled to attend this Institute. Any one interested in the furtherance of agriculture, residents of Illinois or not, will be welcomed to attend any of the sessions.

It will be one of the biggest and best ever held in this state.
