**MISSIONERY HAD VERY INTERESTING BULGARIAN TRIP**

W. W. Peet, Relative of Local People, Had Interview With Bulgar's King.

Many citizens of Downers Grove will be interested in an item that appears in the last number of the Bible Society Record. The Mr. Peet referred to is a cousin of Mr. Naramore, Mrs. Stanley and Mrs. Bartle. The article follows:  
 "From Bulgaria comes unusual testimony to the value of our work, in the following extract from a letter of Mr. W. W. Peet, Acting Agency Secretary of the Levant Agency:  
 "I had a very interesting trip last week in company with Dr. J. L. Barton, foreign secretary of the A. B. C. F. M., to Bulgaria. We visited Sofia, where we had an interview with the minister of Public Education, Prime Minister, and where we also were invited to the palace by the King and had a pleasant inter-

view with him. Afterward we went to Samakov, where the principal national institutions of the American Mission are located."  
 "One very pleasant feature of our visit to Samakov was the visit by a deputation of prominent persons headed by the Mayor. In the course of his speech of welcome, he stated that the Bulgarian nation is indebted among other things to the Americans for their inestimable services in translating the Holy Scriptures into the spoken language of the people. The Scriptures in this form have served to unite their people at a time when divisive forces were operating against them. I was very much struck with this testimony from an adherent of the old Church, which is of a kind not often expressed publicly, even if believed."

Mexican War Losses.  
 The number of men engaged in the Mexican war on the American side consisted of 42,545 regulars and 73,776 volunteers. The losses of regulars were: Killed, 536; wounded, 2,100; died of wounds, 408. Volunteers killed, 513; wounded, 1,818; died of wounds, 100. This does not include deaths by disease.
