#### IDAHO RABBIT DRIVES NETTED **30,000 BUNNIES**

In 18 rabbit drives conducted in 3 successive weeks by the Bingham Co., Idaho, Farm Bureau, with the co-operation of the Biological Survey, of United States Department of Agrienture, 30,500 rabbits were killed The first week there were 4 drives in 3 communities, and the number of rabbits destroyed was 8,000. The second week 8 drives were held in communities, attended by 1,900 people, and resulting in the killing of 4 communities were attend-1.600 people and resulted in he killing of 10,500 mabbits.


