FATHER SHERAN GAVE FINE ADDRESS AT ST. JOSEPH CATHOLIC CHURCH

Those Who Braved Zero Weather Amply Repaid by Hearing Excellent Sermon

Those who braved the ten below zero of last Sunday to hear Father Sheran on "The Hound of Heaven," were richly repaid. While expectations were wrought to a high pitch he certainly delivered a remarkable "Appreciation" of what he termed the greatest lyric poem in modern English literature.

The background of the masterpiece, according to the lecturer, lay in the fact that every Englishman loves a dog, and particularly a hound—that indeed one of the ambitions of the gentry seems to be to own a "pack," in order to be able to join the Chase. Witness in English art the familiar red-pantalooned horseman riding after the hounds.

Now, just as the "quarry," followed by the ever-pursuing hound, off doubles about and flees in devious ways, even so does Man in the maze of life, winding thru its labyrinthine pathways—in the valley of sorrows and the mountaintops of success—find himself ever pursued by Divine Love—typified by the Hound in the Chase.

As the opening stanza of the poem has it, so beautifully put:

I fled him, down the nights and down the days; I fled him down the arches of the years; I fled him down the labyrinthine ways Of my own mind; and in the mist of tears I hid from Him, and under running laughter, Up vistaed hopes I sped; And shot, precipitated, Adown Titanic glooms of chasmed fears.

From those strong feet that followed, followed after, But with unhurrying chase, And unperturbed pace, Deliberate speed, majestic instancy, They beat—and a Voice beat More instant than the Feet— All things: betray thee, who betrayest Me.

The Reverend Father, in a dramatic style worthy of the high subject, went on to illustrate wherein the author's conception is precisely obverse to that of Poe in "The Raven," when, in answer to every question, the Raven's words of "Never-more" are surrounded as a death-knell to hope, with a finality beyond resurrection. Divine Love, however, on the contrary, never becoming weary of the oft-times apparently fruitless pursuit of Man's soul, finally wins the Chase and Faith is triumphant over Death.

All who have enjoyed the privilege of such rare literary and spiritual feasts, anticipate with much pleasure the possibility of having Father Sheran come again and often, which Dr. Goodwin announces will be not infrequently during Lent.
