SUICIDE WANTED TO MAKE SURE JOB OF IT

Elburn Farmer Employs 3 Methods Of Ending Life—One was Successful.

Fear of being committed to the county jail for theft of a machine belting, for which he had been arrested, caused Swain Wilkenson, 31, Elburn farmer, to commit suicide, according to a coroner's jury which investigated his death.

Wilkenson mapped out three ways to end his life. To make sure that he was successful he resorted to all of them.

Crawling to the highest point in the hay loft he fastened a rope a-

round his neck and then tied it to one of the large beams. After drinking a cup of paris green, he shot himself twice in the breast and then jumped out of the loft. The rope broke under his weight and he fell thirty feet to the floor.

According to witnesses at the inquest, Wilkenson had been arrested on a charge of larceny, being accused of the theft of a machine belting at a farm sale. Worry over the outcome of his hearing, called for next week, is believed to have caused him to take his life.

The suicide was a brother of Willis Wilkenson, tenant on the old "Jones Farm," three miles west of Elburn.—West Chicago Press.
