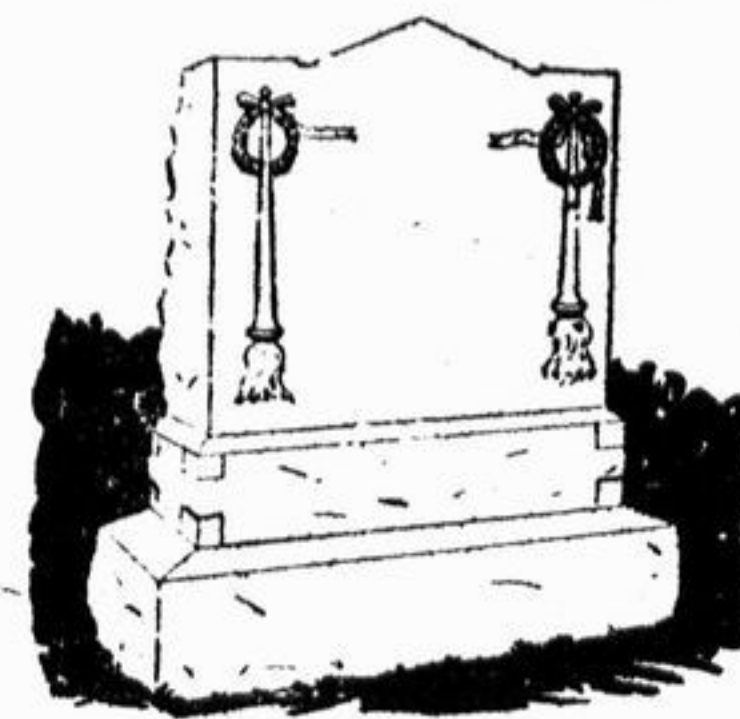

The services were well attended on Easter Day at St. Paul's church in spite of the storm. Fourteen new members were added to the church.

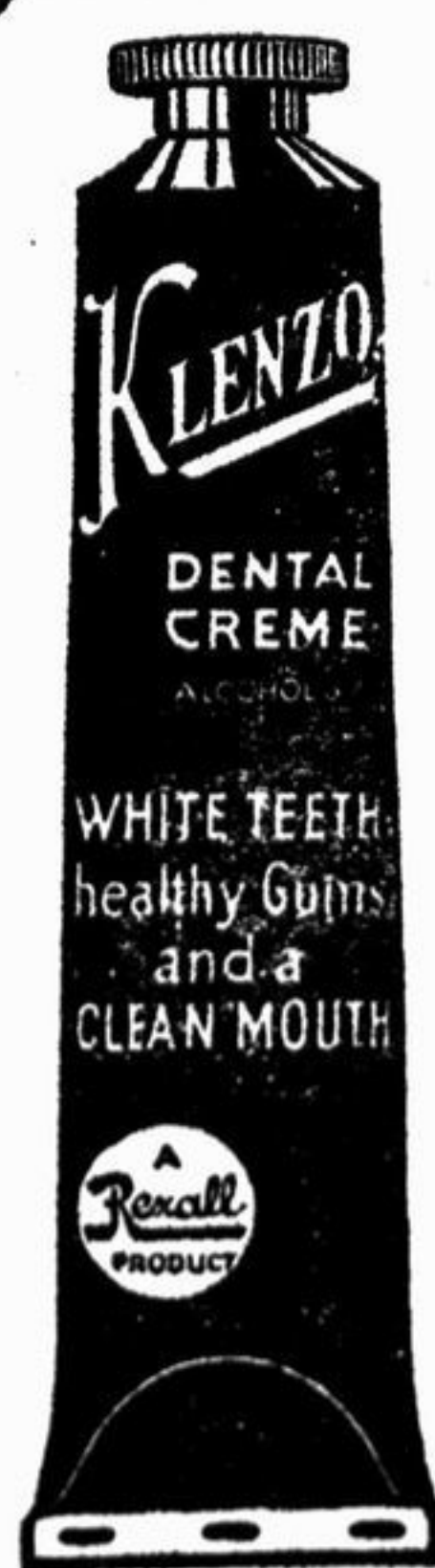
