Judy, a little country girl, lives with her supposed grandfather, her sister Olive and their cousin Denny, aged four. Grandpop, soured by the elopement of his daughter Claudia, ill-uses Denny. Judy, the tender-hearted, to shield Denny effects a bargain to take two blows for every one Grandpop intends for Denny.
