### SCOUT COUNCIL PLANS PURCHASE OF CAMPING SITE Delegates From Downers Grove

Scout Executive Barnes Will Meet With Local Boy Scout Heads On Monday.

A meeting of the local council will be held in the old Congregationa church next Monday evening at 7:30 The Lombard Club were fortunate in o'clock. A Scout Masters association, for the West Suburban District, has recently been formed and the first meeting of the association was held at the home of Scout Master King of Berwyn last Monday evening.

This month the first of several cabins to be built in the Forest Prererve for the scouts of this district was completed and dedicated. The dedication was under the control of the Berwyn Council and the cabin is located in the State Forest Preserve near DesPlaines.
