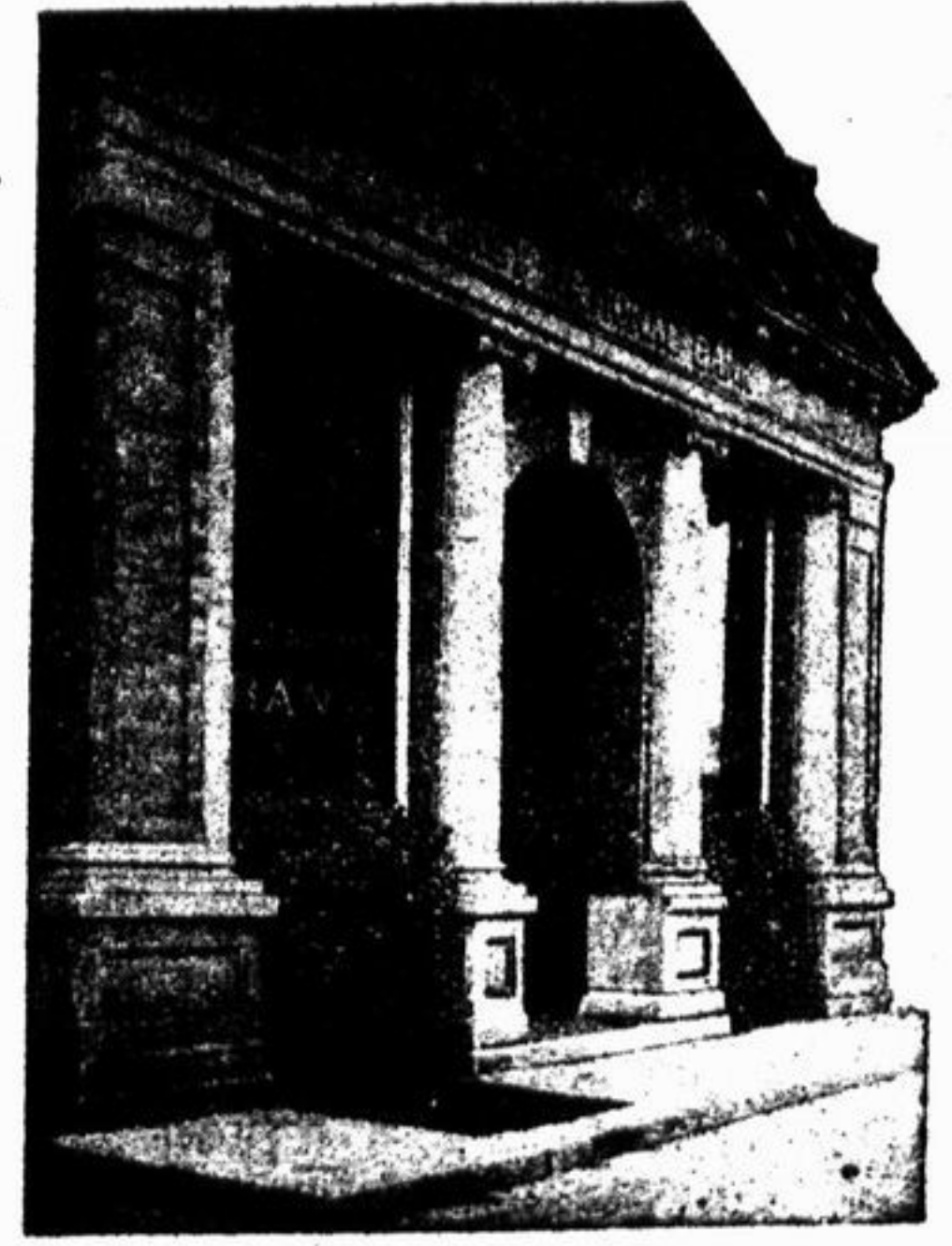
1st EVANGELICAL TO HAVE SPECIAL MUSIC THRU MAY
