FOR HUMAN RACE Diet Would be "Topsy-Turvey" With out Familiar Loaf. . Is Most Economical, Nutritious.

Bread. What is it? Giving everyone credit for knowing the ingredients used in making the commonly known bread that has a regular place on the average dining room table, the question remains answered in part only.

Bread, as a food for the human race, is without parallel. Since the stone age it has been the mainstay of May 13, 1920, Thursday. Ascension diet-the very sinew of human life.

Poverty and famine through centuries have been always heralded by the afflicted persons with the cry "Give us bread"-never give us peas, potatoes, or any of the score of other foods known to the average individ-

Without bread the diet of the human race would be set "topsy-turvey." Why is this?

The answer is that wheat is the greatest human food. In every grain there is a complete ration of raw food to meet the needs of the human body. Baked into bread it is the most palatable, wholesome and economical food.

Dr. Robert Hutchinson, F. R. C. R., one of the world's most famous dieticians, says in his book on "Food

"Bread is the least watery of vege-Commissioner Heartt presented the table foods, and is relatively less so than meat. Weight for weight, bread must be regarded as one of the most nutritious of our ordinary foods. This is due to the fact that three-fifths of it consists of solid nutriment. There are no animal foods and but few vegetables of which this can be said." Another excerpt from Dr. Hutchinson's volume is:

"Bread is not only one of the most nutritious, but it is also among the cheapest foods. For a given sum one obtains a larger number of cal ories from bread than from any other

French people have been most alert 30 Acres Trees, Shrubs, and to the high nutritive qualities bread. They are recognized as having the biggest bread appetites in the world. The daily bread consumption of the average Frenchman, we are told by French scientists, is 600 grammes daily. When ingested this Landscape Gardening our furnishes the Frenchman with 1560 calories, or 46 per cent of an adult's daily food requirements.

Although the average person is not familiar with the relative caloric value of foods, nature seems to have provided a certain instinct regarding foods which becomes apparent during moments of extreme hunger. At such times the individual demands bread. Scientists have recognized this fact and during the recent periods of food shortage in Europe, when wheat was at a premium, every Continental nation sought to appease the public appetite for bread with substitutes prepared in bread form and endowed

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
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
