OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE VILLAGE BOARD

Downers Grove, Ill., May 17, 1920. Regular meeting of the Council of the Village of Downers Grove, Ill. Present at roll call Mayor W. C. Barber and Commissioners Bender, Haller and Heartt. Commissioner Bryce absent. Came in later.

Minutes of the meeting of May 10, 1920, were read and Commissioner Heartt moved to approve same. On roll call Commissioners Heartt, Bender, Bryce, Haller and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

Commissioner Heartt presented the semi-monthly pay roll for the period from May 1st, 1920, to May 15th, 1920 and moved to approve same and have warrants drawn for the several amounts as follows:

PAY ROLL table with columns for Dept. of Accounts & Finances, Dept. of Health & Safety, Dept. Streets & Public Imp., Dept. of Public Property.

On roll call Commissioners Heartt, Bender, Bryce, Haller and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

Commissioner Bryce presented the following resolution and moved for its passage: RESOLVED, That by reason of a petition being filed with the Village Clerk, asking the Council to reconsider its vote in respect to the passage of a certain ordinance entitled "An Ordinance repealing an ordinance licensing the sale of cigarettes in the Village of Downers Grove, County of DuPage, Illinois, passed on April 26, 1920, the Council is of the opinion, upon reconsideration, that the said ordinance be not repealed, but that a special election be called, in conformity with Section 48 of the Laws of Illinois relating to the Commission Form of Government for Municipalities.

On roll call Commissioners Bryce, Bender, Haller, Heartt and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

Commissioner Heartt presented the following resolution and moved for its passage: RESOLVED, That a special election be held on the 19th day of June 1920, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of this Village the question whether or not a certain Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Repealing an Ordinance Licensing the Sale of Cigarettes in the Village of

Downers Grove, County of DuPage, State of Illinois," passed by the Village Council of the Village of Downers Grove on April 26th, 1920, shall be repealed or declared to be in full force and effect.

On roll call Commissioners Heartt, Bender, Bryce, Haller and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

Commissioner Bryce presented the following resolution and moved for its passage:

RESOLUTION RESOLVED, That the Western Electric Company's bid on the Power Panel and Throw-over Panel for the Power Plant, being the only bid submitted in accordance with the bids advertised for, by the Village of Downers Grove, the Village Council is of the opinion that the Village of Downers Grove should purchase the Western Electric Company's Power Panel and Throw-over Panel, at the price of \$1,820.00 and that the necessary steps be taken for the purpose of signing a contract and to arrange terms of payment, and that the Mayor of said Village is authorized to sign said contract after and when the terms of said contract are arranged, determined and approved by the Council.

On roll call Commissioners Bryce, Bender, Haller, Heartt and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

Commissioner Bryce moved to adjourn to the next regular meeting date May 24th, 1920. On roll call Commissioners Bryce, Bender, Haller, Heartt and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

On motion of Commissioner Heartt the report of the Audit of the Village Books by R. S. Buchanan & Co. for the fiscal year beginning May 1st, 1919, and ending April 30th, 1920, was

ordered placed on the records. On roll call Commissioners Heartt, Bender, Bryce, Haller and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

The following letter from the Chicago Telephone Company was read: To the Mayor and Council, Village of Downers Grove. Mr. Chas. M. Hitch, Village Clerk, Downers Grove, Illinois. Gentlemen:

Chicago Telephone Company hereby presents this its written and unconditional acceptance of an ordinance tendered to it, entitled "An ordinance granting the Chicago Telephone Company certain rights in the Village of Downers Grove, DuPage County, Illinois," which said ordinance remained on file with the Village Clerk of said Village for public inspection complete in the form in which it was finally passed. From and after the 23rd day of February, A. D. 1920, and which said ordinance was finally passed by the Council of said Village of Downers Grove on the 1st day of March A. D. 1920, and approved by the Mayor of said Village on the 1st day of March A. D. 1920, and which said ordinance was also duly authorized and approved by a majority of the electors of the Village of Downers Grove voting at a general election held on the 20th day of April A. D. 1920, and requests that this acceptance be filed in the office of said Village Clerk as provided in said ordinance.

The Record of Twenty-Five Legal Reserve Companies At the end of the year 1918, twenty-five of the leading old line life insurance companies had insurance in force of \$15,502,645,846—about twice the amount of protection carried by the same number of fraternal societies, because many of the companies have been in business longer than the societies. The income of these twenty-five companies for 1918 was \$844,322,422 and \$260,670,126 was paid to beneficiaries and policy holders in death claims and endowments. The cost of managing these companies for the year 1918 was \$70,403,421. Thus only 31 per cent of the dollars contributed to these companies for the year went to pay death claims and endowments. The Old Line Dollars Demonstrated Cost of management twenty-five leading old line companies year 1918, \$70,403,421, with insurance in force amounting to \$15,502,645,846; The policy holders were required to pay \$4.54 for each \$1,000 of insurance as management cost. The Record of Twenty-Five Fraternal Societies At the end of the year 1918, the twenty-five leading fraternal insurance societies had insurance in force of \$7,067,832,820. Their income was \$110,146,234 for the year. They paid to beneficiaries \$85,035,148 as death and disability benefits. The cost of managing these fraternal societies during the same time was \$6,076,898, or about one-tenth of the expense for the same number of old line companies. Thus the fraternal societies applied 77 per cent of their income to payment of death and disability claims, as against 31 per cent in the same number of old line companies. The Fraternal Insurance Dollars Demonstrated Cost of management insurance twenty-five fraternal insurance societies year 1918, \$6,076,898, with insurance in force of \$7,067,832,820; The certificate holders were required to pay only 86 cents for each \$1,000 of insurance as management cost. Comparing The Ratios Continuing the subject by making a direct comparison, observe the following: Ratio of benefits paid to income—old line companies, 31 per cent; fraternal societies, 77 per cent. Cost of management old line companies for each \$1,000 insurance in force, \$4.54; fraternal societies, 86 cents. The Whys And Wherefores of the Dollars What do these figures and comparisons denote? Easily answered and self-evident that fraternal insurance societies are more economically managed than old line life insurance companies. The premium-payer to old line companies is required to submit to the expenditure of a large proportion of his dollars for management cost and expenses.
