**World War Vets Line.**  
Led by A. W. Abbot of Lisle Township, formerly Captain of the 42nd Infantry, the line of ex-service men is expected to make a brave showing. From present indications there will be over a hundred in line of former soldiers, sailors and marines.

Every ex-service man and woman who lives in or near Downers Grove is expected to report at the high school at 2 o'clock. It is requested that they wear a uniform if they have one, otherwise report anyway.

**Window Dedication.**  
After the observances of the day at the cemetery, the ex-soldiers accompanied by the band will march to Saint Andrew's Episcopal Church, here a short dedication service will take place when a memorial window will be unveiled and dedicated in honor of John Bryan, a member of the church, who lost his life in the world war.

The window will be a beautiful reproduction of the Marine insignia, the branch of service to which the young man belonged.

All those who wish may attend this service as it is public.

Following the ceremonies the La Grange Band will give a concert at Main and Curtiss streets for the balance of the afternoon.
