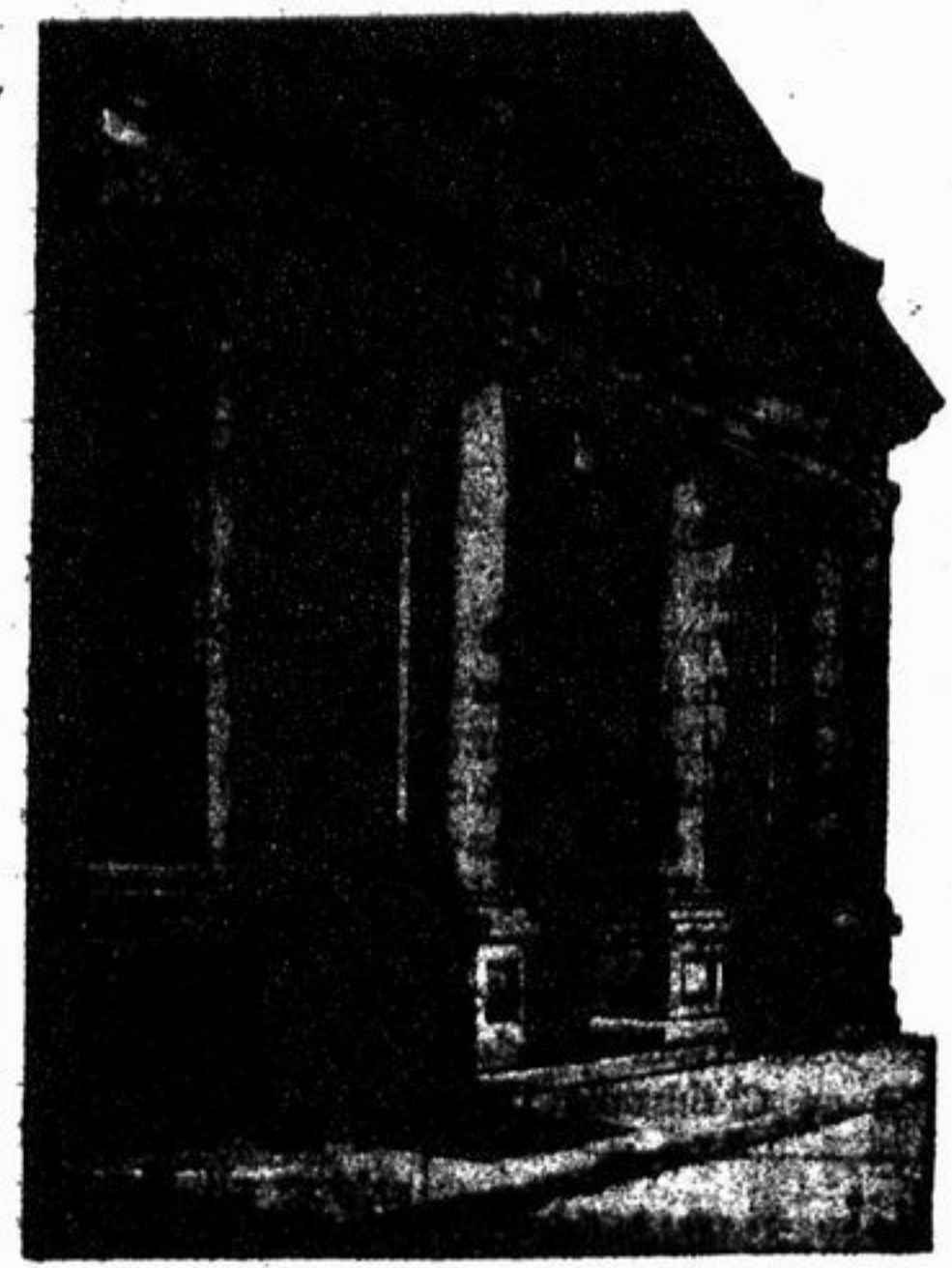
Dr. Leonard, pastor of the First Congregational Church of LaGrange, read the words which made them man and wife.

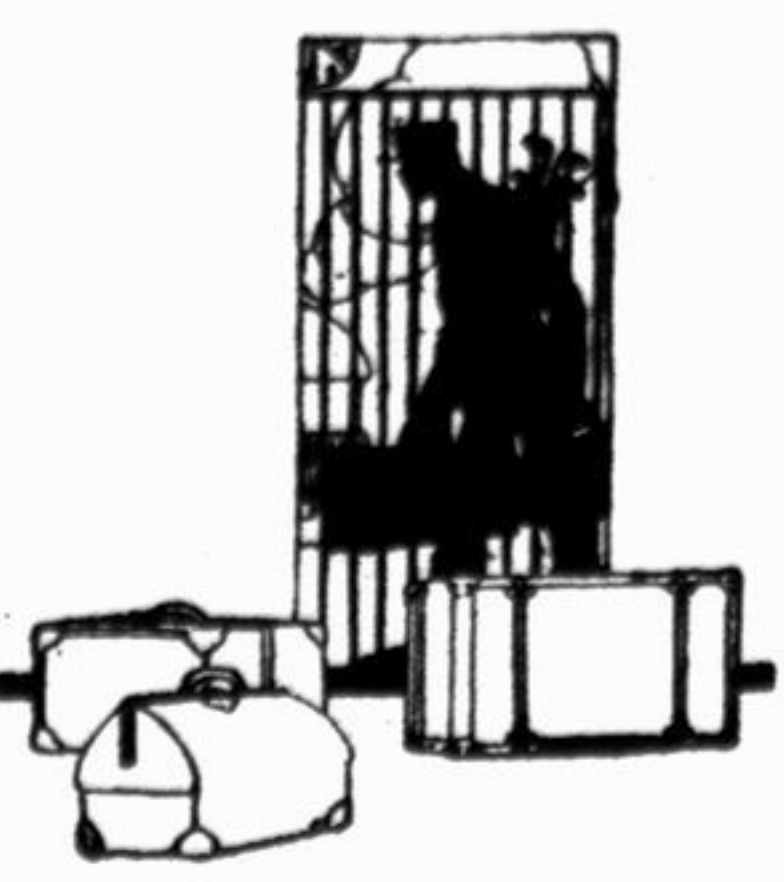
