and Congressman Rodenberg in a magnificent speech names Governor Frank Orrin Lowden of Illinois. That was the signal for the start of the biggest demonstration of the day. Lowden banners appeared as if by magic in the delegate section and headed by the state standards of Kentucky, Iowa and Illinois the Lowden delegates started a parade of the aisles. It was only after 43 minutes of noise that the vast hall was gavelled into submission. Another demonstration started as Gov. Morrow of Kentucky, seconded the nomination of Gov. Lowden, when he said, "Nominate Gov. Lowden and we will break the Hindenburg line of the solid South next November."

Undoubtedly the best nominating speech of the day was made by ex-Gov. Willis of Ohio, when he nominated Senator Harding. This man with the megaphone voice brought the crowd up sharp with his ringing sentences. He received the most spontaneous applause of any of the Nationally known orators who nominated or seconded the men before the convention.

After every aspirant for the honor of heading the ticket had been placed in nomination, the first ballot was taken. This was the final scene of the show and one which spectators and delegates alike had been awaiting with ill concealed impatience. The expectant hush which settled over the crowd as the first roll call of States was taken, showed their interest. The first ballot was as had been freely predicted for weeks. On the second however changes began to manifest themselves and the steady climb by Lowden was started.

As the roll calls for the third and fourth ballots progressed it was apparent that Gov. Lowden had the best chance of winning a majority of the delegates. As the delegates began to swing their votes from favorite sons to the Lowden column, the volume of noise grew greater. The galleries, which held visitors from every part of the country, were almost a unit on the fourth ballot in their cheering for Illinois' favorite son, but it was not to be.

On Saturday, immediately after the first ballot, it was a foregone conclusion that Harding would be the nominee. Gov. Lowden seeing that he had no more chance, released his delegates who flocked to the Harding standard, nominating him. Gen. Wood and his backers fought to the last ditch, even on the last ballot holding together.

ANIMALS SAVE LIVES OF HERO AND HEROINE IN CURWOOD PICTURE

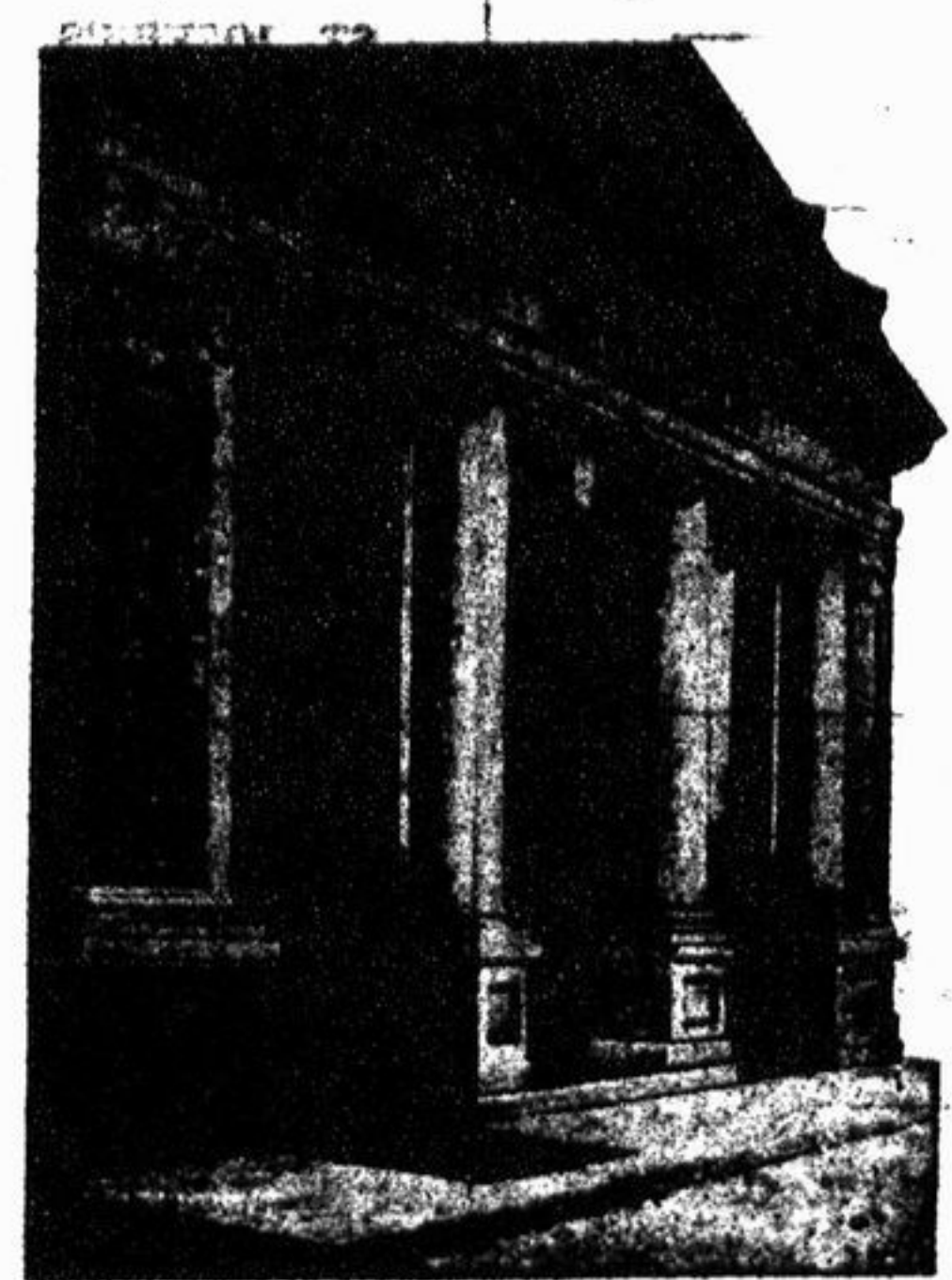
Last November was celebrated the tenth anniversary of his work here.
