For twelve innings Right Fielder Geiselman of the White Rocks sat on the bench with nothing to do but look wise. Seeing that he had made the trip from Chicago his manager decided he ought to at least get a chance to swing his mighty war club before the flying missiles that Ehninger was hurling. He did what was seemingly the inevitable. Herb had the count 3 and 2 and then shot a hot one over the right corner which Geiselman clouted for a single and started on his way to break up the game. He had pulled a single in the 12th and almost mused up affairs then. He stole second when Binder goofed a neat peg to the keystone-sack by Nash. Lage lifted a tall one to left center which was a little too far for Skidmore to pickle. Nash then pulled a very, very, wicked boner on Skidmore's peg in which Ehninger got a little left of the home plate. Nash ran over to back up Herb and forgot about covering home. The ball was in Ehninger's hands when Geiselman was ten feet from the plate and if Nash had been playing the game as he should they might have been playing yet. Things were rather rotten from then on and the White Rocks took advantage of the break in the defense and netted two more markers before the game was over. The locals threw the game away several times and had it cinched three times if a timely wallop had been poked out. Binder aided the White Rocks in tying the score in the fifth when he made a bad job of Bixby's hot liner juggling the ball just long enough to make it impossible to nip Lage at the plate after he had knocked a three sack clout to the tall timbers in extreme right.

In the sixth the locals gathered two doubles and filled the sacks but could not poke a run across. Nash failed in the pinch and struck out. In the ninth the locals again absorbed the sacks but lacked the big punch. Nash opened with a single. Hawkins and Mochel doing likewise after Bixby had thrown Nash out at second on Mrvicka's roller. Carpenter rolled an easy one to Dunn and was tossed out closing the spasm.

Now that we've told of the faults of the game whysay we spill a little joy a bit. It looked like a slugging fest to us at first as Mochel greeted Pitcher Bixby with a screamer to deep center and Carpenter followed with a single giving Mochel a free ride to the plate but Pitcher Bixby wouldn't have it that way so he neatly struck out old timer Bruns. From then on it was a pitchers duel in every sense of the word. Ehninger was at his best allowing but four scattered hits in ten innings. In the pinches Herb hurled like a veteran. In the second Lupe lit out with a three corner wallop and Herb lightened, fanning three in a row. Bixby was also showing good form in hurling although the locals managed to garner 12 hits in the 14 rounds of duelling and put Bixby in some bad holes, he set to the task and breezed some fast ones over that were puzzling. Ehninger gleaned 19 strike outs while Bixby collected an even dozen. In the sixth the locals had two on and Ehninger was waving the stick. The infield moved in and Wagner showed good form at handling Ehninger's vicious drive tossing Carpenter out at the plate.

A record vote is expected on the proposition as everyone in the district is interested now or will be by the time election day dawns.


