#### ANSWERING MR. BERRYMAN

On another page will be found a letter from Mr. John B. Berryman, who has one of the show places of the county north of the village on Highland Avenue.

In this letter Mr. Berryman in talking of the proposed Community High School, quotes figures giving the cost of maintaining the LaGrange and Deerfield High Schools on an up-to-date basis.

It is hardly fair to compare these enormous institutions with the one which it is proposed to inaugurate here.

Take LaGrange for instance. The territory served by the Lyons Township High School includes all of Lyons, township with the many small and large villages contained within it. The enrollment of the Senior Class alone was as large last year as the entire enrollment in the local high school. LaGrange, LaGrange Park, parts of Brookfield, Western Springs, Summit, Argo, all these towns and adjacent territory is served by this school. That is, it was served. This district has been divided and next year the expense will not be as great as in the past.

As for the Deerfield High School, we are not as familiar with this institution of learning as with our

neighbor, but we venture to say that it also, is much larger than our own. The towns of Highland Park, and Lake Forest with their adjoining territory would naturally enroll more students. This school is one also which puts all the "frills" possible on the high school work. The class of people which it serves demand the frills and get them, by the way, also paying for them.

#### WHAT TO DO NOW WITH THE CIGARETTE QUESTION

The voters of Downers Grove last Saturday indicated by an almost two to one vote that they were not in sympathy with the action of the Village Council in prohibiting the sale of cigarettes in the village.

It is now up to the Council to straighten up this matter in the way which a majority of the people seem to want.

We can perhaps be pardoned for trying to advise them on this matter. We have talked to any number of people in the past week to find out their views on the subject. The consensus of opinion seems to be in line with the recommendations made by us last week, namely: That the Council, after repealing the present ordinance, fix things as they were before with the added provision making it illegal to sell cigarettes to minors. This is what the Parent-Teacher Association asked for when the agitation was started. Incorporate in this ordinance also a clause forfeiting the license of the dealer if he evades its provisions. AND THEN ENFORCE THE LAW TO THE LETTER.

In issuing these permits impress strongly upon those taking them out that there will be no half-way measures in enforcing them. That the dealers will either live up to the provisions of the law or they will not be allowed to sell cigarettes.

#### WIDEST PUBLICITY PLANNED FOR COMMUNITY HIGH SCHOOL

### STATE VETERINARIANS CO-OPERATE WITH I. A. A.

Hog raisers of DuPage County will be interested in definite action taken at the summer meeting of the Illinois State Veterinary Medical Association at Champaign July 8 and 9 where the following proposition with reference to the immunization of hogs against cholera was proposed: The Veterinarian shall, when requested, state the particular kind and brand of serum and virus used and the serial and license number of each and their net cost to him. This statement may be rendered on a uniform blank agreed upon by a joint committee of the Illinois State Veterinary Medical Association at an early date. Members from this County are: Dr. H. Caldwell, Wheaton; Dr. J. H. Cheny, Downers Grove; Dr. Thos. P. Gallahue, Elmhurst; Dr. T. L. Grubbs, Hinsdale; Dr. S. M. Kennelly, Joliet. Dr. Michael P. Ma-

loney, Joliet; Dr. A. M. Sherwood, Naperville; Dr. John Stiles, Naperville.

The Livestock Marketing Committee of the Illinois Agricultural Association (at a meeting at Bloomington, July 12, agreed to recommend to the Executive Committee of the I. A. A. the adoption of the proposition agreed to by the Veterinary Association.

H. W. Hamford, Director of the Livestock Marketing department of the I. A. A. believes that this arrangement will insure a better understanding between the farmer and his veterinarian, inspire greater confidence between them and at the same time insure the breeder against the occasional veterinarian who is inclined to overcharge for both serum and professional services.
