

Minutes of the meeting of July 19, 1920, were read and Commissioner Bender moved to approve same. On roll call Commissioners Bender, Haller, Bryce, Heartt and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried. Commissioner Bender presented the following resolution and moved for its passage:

RESOLUTION

Resolved, That the Canvas of the vote of the Special Election held in Downers Grove, Illinois, on July 24, 1920. submitting the question "Shall the Village of Downers Grove. Du Page County, Illinois, repeal a certain ordinance passed and approved by the Village Council on June 7th. 1920, entitled 'An ordinance prohib iting the sale of cigarettes and cigarette papers in the Village of Downers Grove. County of DuPage. State of Illinois,' showed that the proposition carried in favor of its repeal, the vote being as follows:

For repeal—Men—236 votes. For repeal-Women-94 votes. Against repeal-Men-81 votes. Against repeal-Women-93 "otes Total for repeal-330. Total against repeal—174.
