A. B. CHATFIELD BORN AT LISLE 78 YEARS AGO, DIES

Civil War Veteran Was an Employee of the Treasury for 39 Years.

Alonzo Bradley Chatfield, for forty years a resident of Washington and one of the oldest and best known citizens in the Mount Pleasant district, where he had resided for four decades, died yesterday at his home 3400 17th street. Death was the culmination of a nervous breakdown, which forced Mr. Chatfield to resign some months ago his office in the Treasury after thirty-nine years of continuous and faithful service.

Mr. Chatfield was born in Lisle, Ill., October 25, 1842, in a time when the middle west was still comparatively unknown and undeveloped territory. President Lincoln's call for volunteers came to him there, and before his nineteenth birthday he enlisted with the 33d Illinois Infantry. He served for two years in battles along the Mississippi terrain under Grant's command until receiving a wound in battle which deprived him of his right arm.

After the close of the war he entered business in Chicago, remaining there for fifteen years during the town's growing period into a city. In 1880 he removed to Washington to accept a position in the Treasury Department where he remained actively on duty since.

Mr. Chatfield was an uncle of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Lacey.
