

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE VILLAGE BOARD

Downers Grove, Ill., Aug. 16 1920. Regular meeting of the Council of the Village of Downers Grove, Ill. Present at roll call Mayor W. C. Barber and Commissioners Bender, Haller, Bryce and Heartt.

Minutes of the meeting of August 9th were read and Commissioner Heartt moved to approve same. On roll call Commissioners Heartt, Bender, Bryce, Haller, and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

Commissioner Heartt presented the semi-monthly pay roll for the period from August 1st 1920 to August 15th 1920, and moved to approve same and have warrants drawn for the several amounts as follows:

Bonds in the amount of \$1,000.00 each with The Aetna Casualty and Surety Co., as surety and Fred D. Heinke, as principal, to cover Plumber and Sewer Builder's licenses were received and approved.

Commissioner Bryce presented the following resolution and moved for its adoption:

RESOLUTION

RESOLVED, That the sum of \$35.00 shall be the fee for water service connections instead of \$25.00, as provided in Ordinance No. 14, under the Commission Form of Government.

On roll call Commissioners Bryce, Bender, Haller, Heartt and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

Commissioner Bender moved to adjourn to the next regular meeting date August 23, 1920. On roll call Commissioners Bender, Bryce, Haller, Heartt and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION

RESOLVED, That it is the sense of the Village Council that before any subdivision now lying without the corporate limits of the Village of Downers Grove, that may wish to be annexed to the Village, that any such subdivision will not be approved by the Council unless the streets provided in said subdivision shall be at least sixty-six (66) feet in width.

On roll call Commissioners Bryce, Bender, Haller, Heartt and Mayor Barber voted Aye. Nays none. Motion carried.

Commissioner Heartt presented the Annual Tax Levy Ordinance and moved that same be put on its passage.

TAX LEVY ORDINANCE

An Ordinance Authorizing the Village Clerk of the Village of Downers Grove, Illinois, in the County of DuPage, to certify to the County Clerk of said County of DuPage, the several sums required to be raised by Taxation for the Corporate Purposes of said Village of Downers Grove for the fiscal year commencing on the First day of May, A. D. 1920 and ending on the 30th day of April, A. D. 1921:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF DOWNERS GROVE, ILLINOIS.

SECTION 1. That Whereas the sum of \$74,450.00 is the total amount heretofore appropriated for all the Corporate Purposes of the Village of Downers Grove for the fiscal year commencing on the First day of May, A. D. 1920 and ending on the 30th day of April, A. D. 1921, and the following named amounts, the total of which has been appropriated by the said Council of the Village of Downers Grove, Illinois, for the fiscal year commencing on the First day of May, A. D. 1920 and ending on the 30th day of April, A. D. 1921:

HARRIETT JOHNSON FORMER RESIDENT DIES IN THE EAST

Mrs. Harriett Johnson, who was born near Downers Grove, 63 years ago, died suddenly at the home of her daughter, Mrs. G. B. Bogart, at Sound Beach, Conn., Monday, August 23rd. Funeral services were held Wednesday.

Mrs. Johnson will be remembered by many of the older residents of the village. Her husband, C. A. Johnson, who preceded her, was for a number of years General Agent of the Burlington in Chicago. They made their home here for many years.

Besides her daughter, she leaves one son, A. H. Johnson, of Greenwich, Conn., two sisters, Mrs. T. M. Manning and Miss Helen Briggs of Naperville and one brother, William O. Briggs of Lisle, to mourn her loss.

\$3,000,000 IN COWAN ESTATE IS SPLIT THIRTEEN WAYS

The \$3,000,000 estate of the late William P. Cowan, Wheaton oil magnate, who died without leaving a will or any known heirs, goes to thirteen poor relatives by a decision handed down by Judge Adam C. Tiffe, in the Sixteenth District Circuit Court. The Court dismissed the appeals of nine other claimants who failed to prove their heirship in the DuPage County Court, where Judge Rathje entered an order of heirship in favor of seven cousins and six children of cousins of the late oil magnate.

FOUR AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION WITHIN 10 YEARS

Congressman Copley Has Voted For Each—Opposition Mostly Due to This Fact.

Four amendments to the Constitution of the United States, the 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th, have been submitted by Congress to the States during the 10 years that Congressman Copley has been a member of Congress. In each case Congressman Copley voted for the amendment and all have been ratified by the required thirty-six states and are now part of our basic law.

The 16th amendment provided for the levying of the tax on incomes, necessity if the men with large incomes were to pay a fair share of the annual cost of government.

The 17th amendment provided for the direct election of senators. First passed by the House in the 62nd Congress, it failed in the Senate and was repassed by the House and agreed to by the Senate in the 63rd Congress. By this amendment the power of the election of United States senators was taken from the state legislature and given directly to the people.

The 18th amendment is as well known to the people today as the Constitution. This is the amendment that provides for the banning of intoxicating liquor from the United States.

The 19th also is before the public at the present time as the recent ac-

tion of the Tennessee legislature should insure its ratification. This provides full and equal suffrage for the women of America.

Four constitutional amendments in 10 years is a record that has never been equalled in America since the adoption of the Bill of Rights in 1791. Three were adopted during the Civil War period. The next forty years until 1911 saw no change in the Constitution.

The present opposition to Congressman Copley is directly due to his vote on the last two amendments. His vote in favor of these amendments brought down upon his head the organized wrath of the radicals of his district and the saloon crowd.

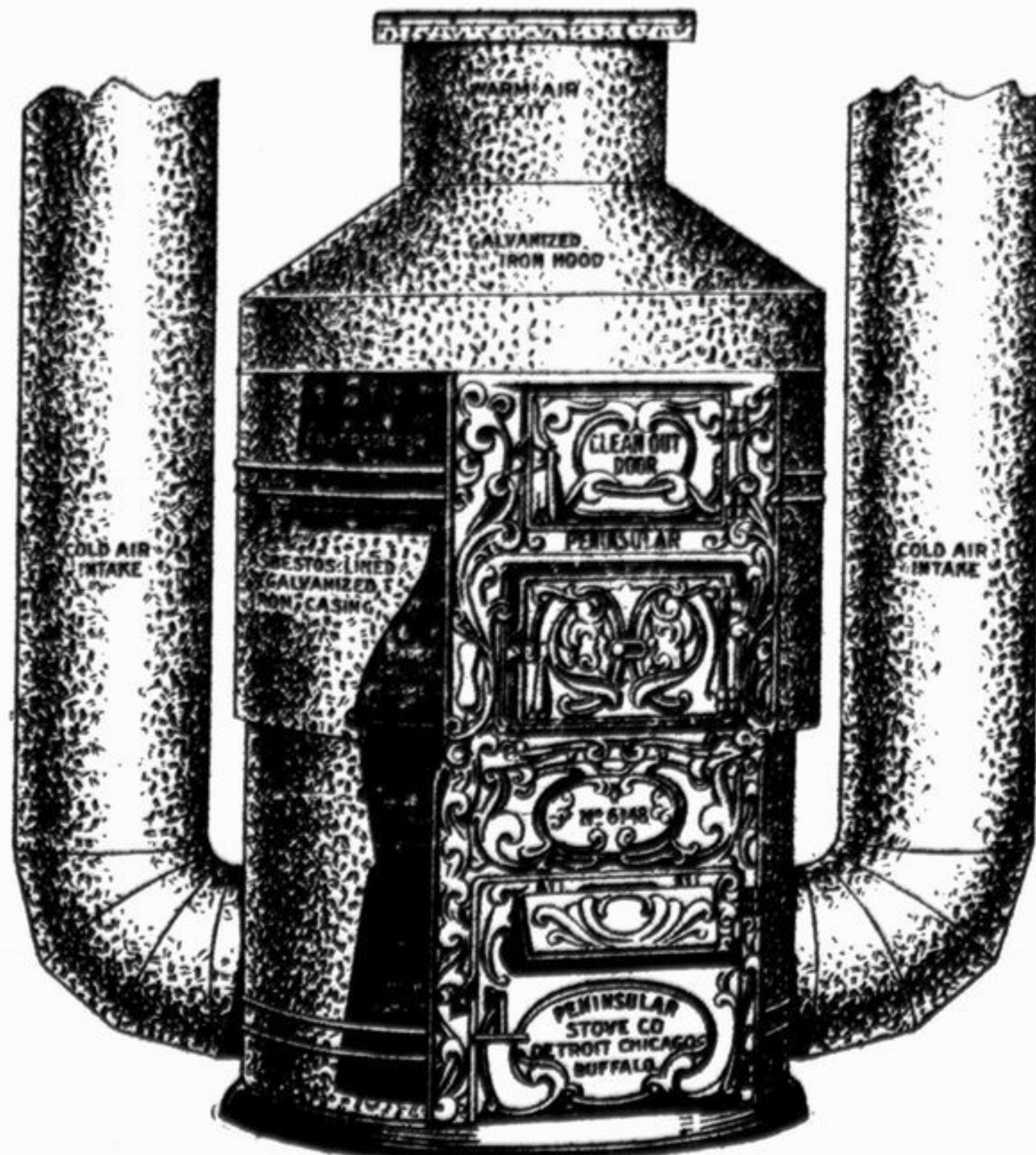
