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DU PAGE COUNTY SHOULD HAVE REPRESENTATION

For the past eight years DuPage County has had no direct representation in the State Legislature. The reason is that we are included in the Senatorial district with Will County and the voting strength of that end of the district greatly outnumbers ours.

However, under the election laws, we have a weapon which we can use to put a DuPage County man in the assembly at Springfield. This is the system under which the candidates are nominated and elected. Under this system men and women may vote for one, two or three candidates. If they vote for three, each receives one vote; for two, one and a half each, and for one, that one receives THREE votes.

This is the weapon we should use to elect George M. Smith of Wheaton. It is known as "plumping" the votes.

Mr. Smith is the editor and publisher of the Wheaton Progressive. He has been in the newspaper business all his life. He bought the Progressive when it was only a piece of junk and since by modern business methods and patient industry, has made a regular printing plant out of it. He is capable of making the people of this district a good representative.

Not being the candidate of any faction of the Republican party, but simply running on his merits as a citizen and as a business man, he should be a very acceptable candidate to the people of this territory.

The primary, when the legislative candidates will be nominated, will be held Wednesday, September 15th. On this date DuPage County voters will have the best chance in years to again be represented at Springfield. For this reason we advocate the "plumping" of three votes for Mr. Smith.

Vote for the DuPage County candidate and for no other, in this way we can win.

Until some standard price is reached, and the present fluctuation in the sugar market continues, the same conditions will prevail.

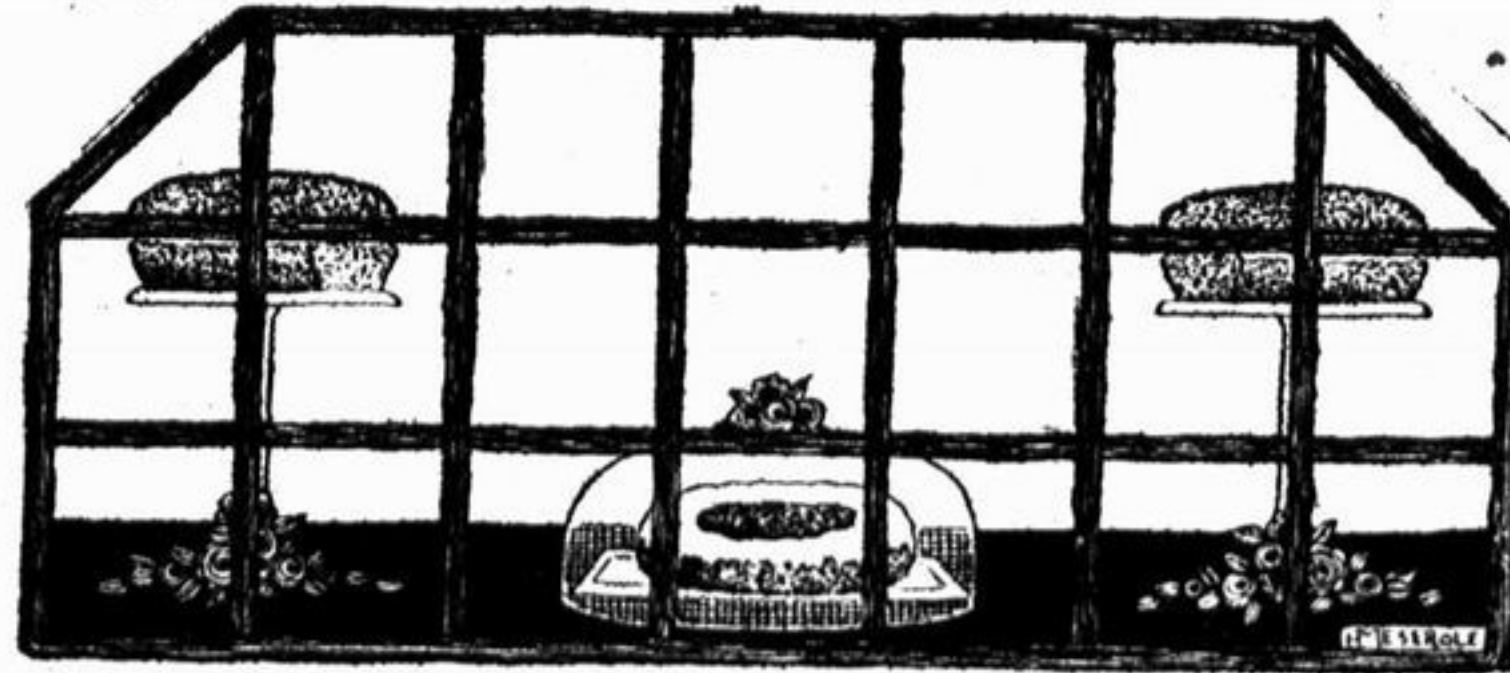
W. E. EICHHORST HAS PURCHASED BAKER TAXI LINE
