BUILDING NEW BRIDGE OVER DES PLAINES ON 12th ST.

Roosevelt Road (Twelfth street) is closed between Des-plaines avenue and First avenue, Maywood, as a new bridge is to be built across the Des-Plaines river. The contract was let last week at a meeting of the Cook County Board. Commissioner T. J. Lynch closed the old bridge and work of dismantling the structure is now under way. He has put First avenue in good condition and all traffic will be routed north to Madison street until the new bridge is completed. The new bridge will be a double span of reinforced concrete and will be a high grade bridge on the same order as the Lake street, Washington boulevard, and Madison street bridge. The contract was let to the only bidder, E. H. Hornberger of Sherman, whose bid was \$29,443.41. The commissioners assert this a very low price considering the high price of all building material.
