OVER MILLION IN TAXATION FOUND BY REVIEW BOARD

Finishes Task at Wheaton Tuesday—\$154,864 More in Assessed Valuation in This Township.

Finishing its task at the county seat on Tuesday the Board of Review found a total of \$1,279,539 in assessed valuation over the figures returned to the county clerk by the assessors of the township. It is estimated that the expense of the board was \$3,000 and that their efforts will net the county between thirty and forty thousand dollars in taxes. The following figures show the totals in each township. These figures are not the assessed valuation of the sections, but the excess found by the board over the totals as given by the township tax assessors. A great deal of this extra value was in estates, the Cowan in Milton furnishing the bulk of their large total.

"ANOTHER" TON OF PRINT GETS US "A-FIGURIN"

Comparison of Costs of Today With Less Than Four Years Ago Are Surprising.

Last week it became apparent that our present supply of "print" paper would not last very much longer and it behooved us, (taking into consideration the much advertised "shortage" in this needful commodity) to get busy and order some more. Just as we were talking over the possibility of its ever coming down in walked a paper salesman and of course the first question was the price of print. His answer was 15-3-4 and you're lucky to get it at that. This price was a little upsetting to say the least as less than four months ago we purchased a ton at 12 cents a pound and this was a raise of three and three-quarters cents a pound in that time. Well to make a long story short, we bought and on Monday afternoon the stock was delivered. Of course we opened a bundle to see what it looked like and you can judge the quality for yourself as what you are now reading is printed on this new supply. Five years ago we would not have accepted this paper but now, what are we to do? The high cost of this print led us to doing a little figuring. Going back less than four years we found that a ton of paper cost us \$80.00. The ton under discussion cost \$315.00 or \$235.00 more, an advance of nearly 400 per cent in less than four years. To each of these items must be added the freight from Chicago, and this is higher now than it was. If it were only the cost of print we might be able to stand it with cut complaining. But everything else in the printing business has skyrocketed. Is it any wonder that the average subscription price for weekly newspapers is nearing \$3. per year? And is it any wonder that more of the weeklies have suspended publication in the last two years than in any other twenty-five years in the history of the country?
