Coal Mine Gases.

The chief gases of coal mines are stated by Coal Age to be: Methane or marsh gas, sometimes called light carbureted hydrogen, carbon monoxide, the whitedamp of ndners, and carbon dioxide, which, with nitrogen. forms the blackdamp. Hydrogen sulphide or sulphureted hydrogen occurs in limited quantities, as do the heavy hydro-carbons ethylene or defiant gas, and ethane. Except carbon dioxide and nitrogen, these gases are all explosive.
