Coal Mine Gases. The chief gases of coal mines are stated by Coal Age to be: Methane or marsh gas, sometimes called light carbonated hydrogen, carbon monoxide, the whitelump of miners, and carbon dioxide, which, with nitrogen, forms the blackdamp. Hydrogen sulphide or sulphuretted hydrogen occurs in limited quantities, as do the heavy hydrocarbons—ethylene or olefiant gas, and ethane. Except carbon dioxide and nitrogen, these gases are all explosive.

Improved Household Bell. Three different signal tones from an electric bell of ordinary appearance, calling the householder to the front, rear, or side door, are now made possible by the ingenious device of an Ohio manufacturer.
