GOOD ROADS NOTES

The first few hundred feet of Highland avenue north of the paving has been surfaced with the new Tarvin construction which is finding such favor in the county. Commissioner Roe is spending every dollar possible before cold weather sets in to get the highways in shape for the winter. If this new type of construction stands up as is expected, Downers Grove township should have mighty fine roads in the next five years.

Wheaton-Naperville travelers will be glad to learn that the commissioner of Lisle Township has commenced work on the Bron-onville hill and that same will soon be surfaced with a three inch covering of tar-bound rock.

Good progress is being made by the contractors on the stretch of Roosevelt Road between Wheaton and West Chicago and with continued good weather it is possible that the road may be completed this year.

A. E. Mertz, highway commissioner of Milton Township, has completed widening and grading the Joliet road between Roosevelt Road and the Bonaparte School house and will soon commence work on St. Charles Road. With the funds at his command Mr. Mertz has done all that could be possibly expected, and it is hoped that in another year the voters of the township will approve the special tax.

Democratic National Convention Rule

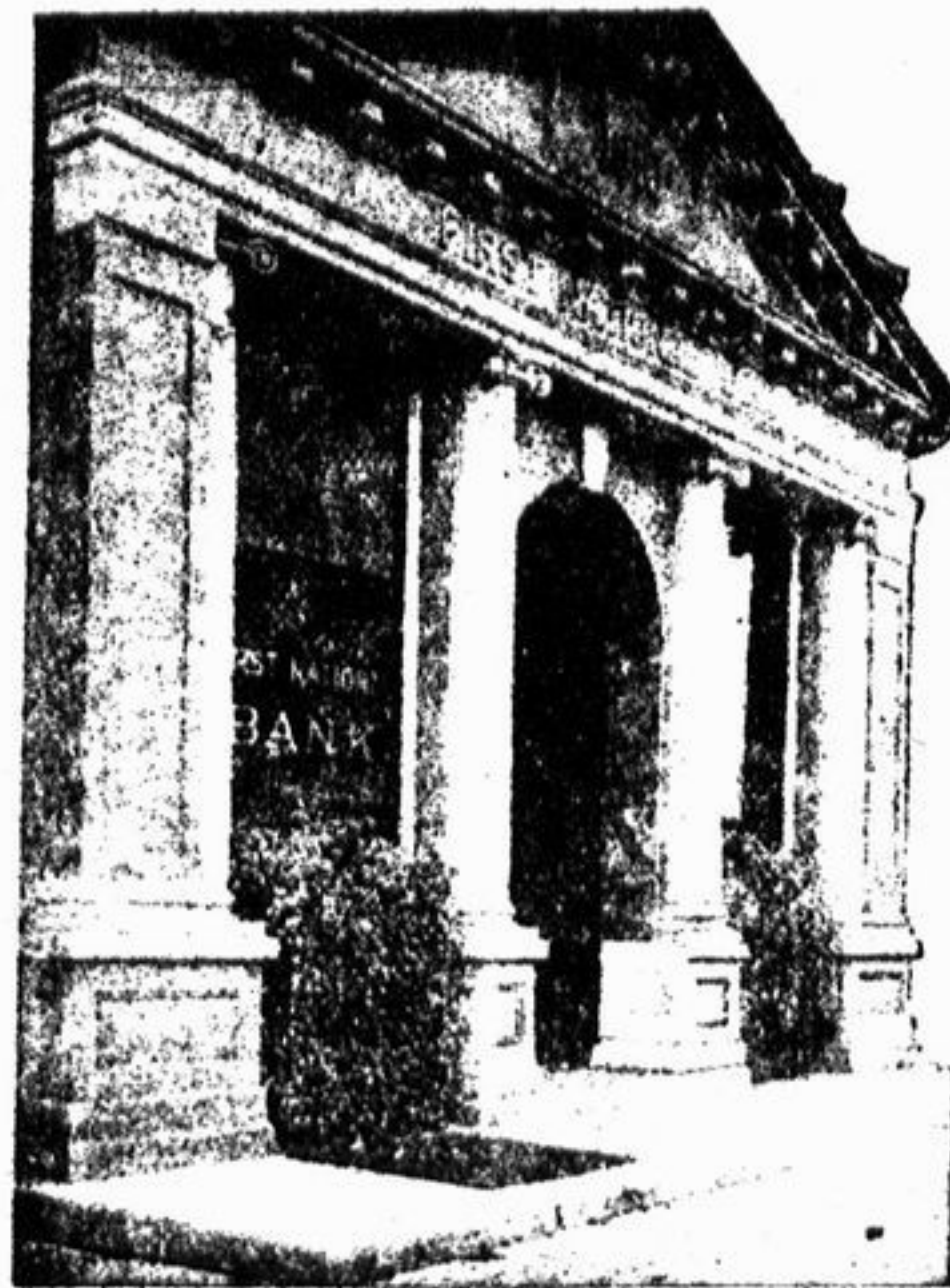
The two-thirds rule was established by the Democratic national convention in Baltimore in 1832 that nominated Andrew Jackson for a second term. His running mate was Martin Van Buren of New York. The rule has been famous and inflexible ever since, though efforts have been made to destroy it. Republicans operate under a majority rule. In the Baltimore convention Jackson was nominated on the ninth ballot. His running mate four years before had been John C. Calhoun of South Carolina.
