FIRE DESTROYS BELMONT GOLF CLUB QUARTERS

Old Landmark Burned to the Ground Monday—Fire Started From Sparks.

Fire completely destroyed the clubhouse of the Belmont Golf Club north of the Belmont station, Monday afternoon. The roof caught fire from sparks from the chimney and in no time both the clubhouse and the water tank had burned to the ground. A little of the furniture was saved by employees who were there but nearly all the clothing and property of the members was consumed.

This fire wipes out one of the landmarks of this vicinity. The Belmont Club is an old institution as it was the first golf club to be organized west of the Alleghenys. The first games were played on its links in 1893.

Owen Fleming, secretary of the club, has said that it is a little too early to discuss plans for re-building at present but that a new structure would be erected next year. Plans for the annual harvest home dinner which was to be given Saturday night have not been called off. The dinner will be given in a tent erected on the grounds.

ROBINSON CASE CONTINUED TO OCTOBER 23RD

American Legion Has Retained Attorney Harvey Gungel, of Aurora, for Defense.

Acting upon a motion of G. H. Bunge for the defense, Judge Slusser continued the case of Nolen B. Robinson, convicted for the murder of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Brown of Wheaton, from last Friday to October 23. On this date the Judge will hear pleas on motions to have the verdict set aside or permission to carry the case into a higher court.

Capt. Merritt of Lombard, acting for the American Legion has retained Attorney Harvey Gungel of Aurora, for the defense and will pay the expenses of taking the case to a higher court if necessary. Mr. Gungel won a great deal of notoriety when he successfully defended Petras of Aurora who was accused of the murder of Theresa Hollander several years ago.
