### The Backward Bird.

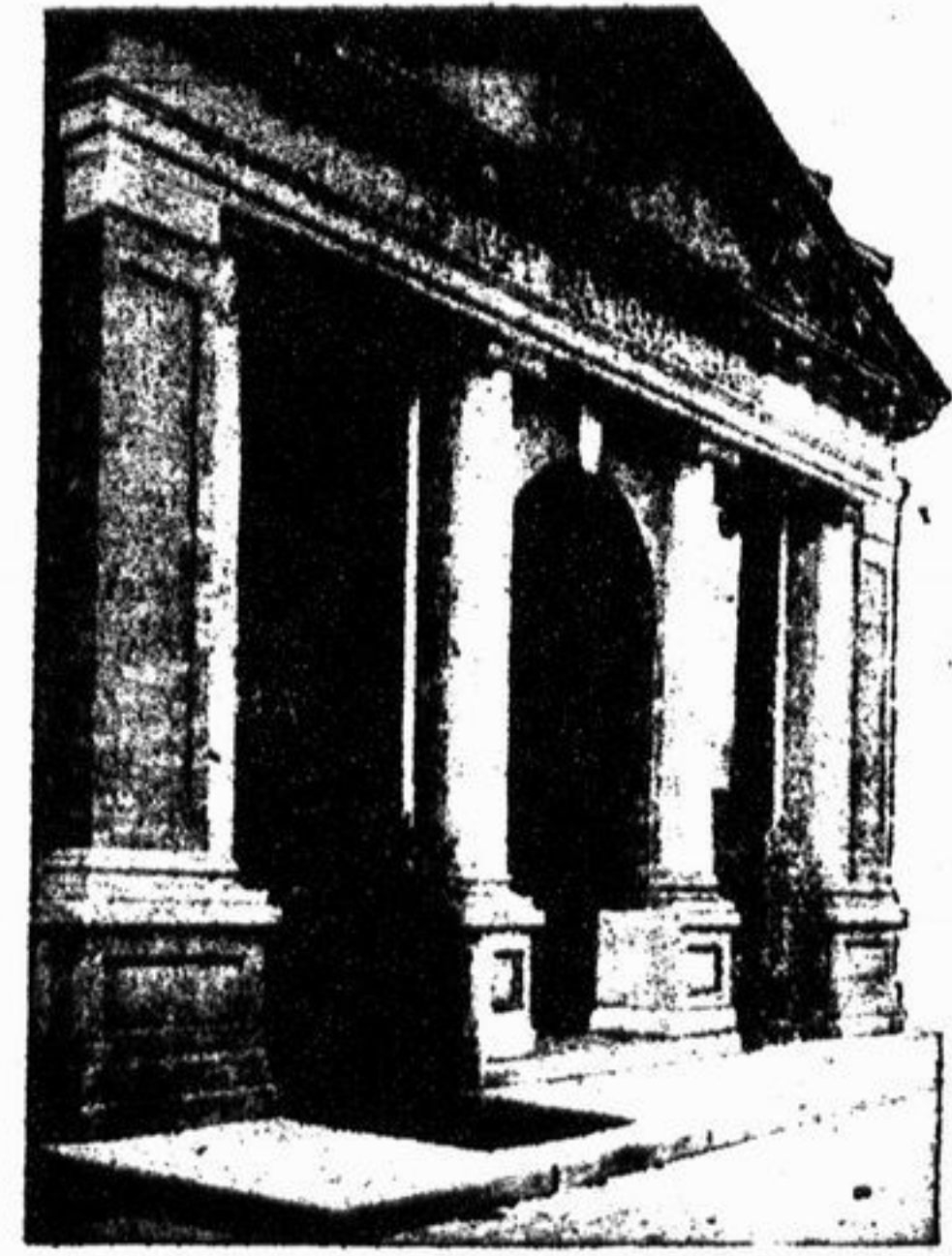

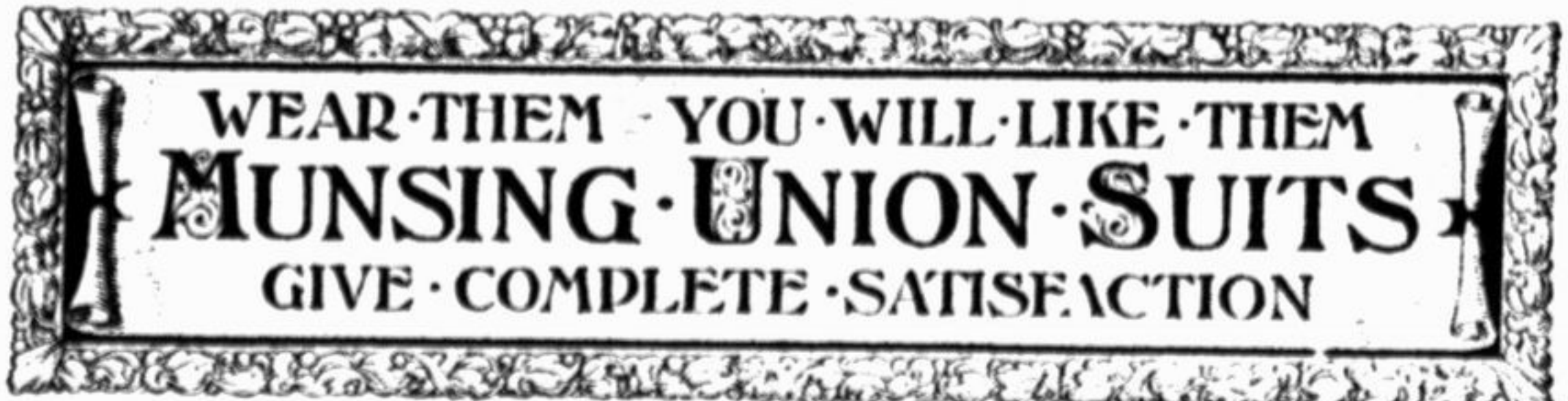
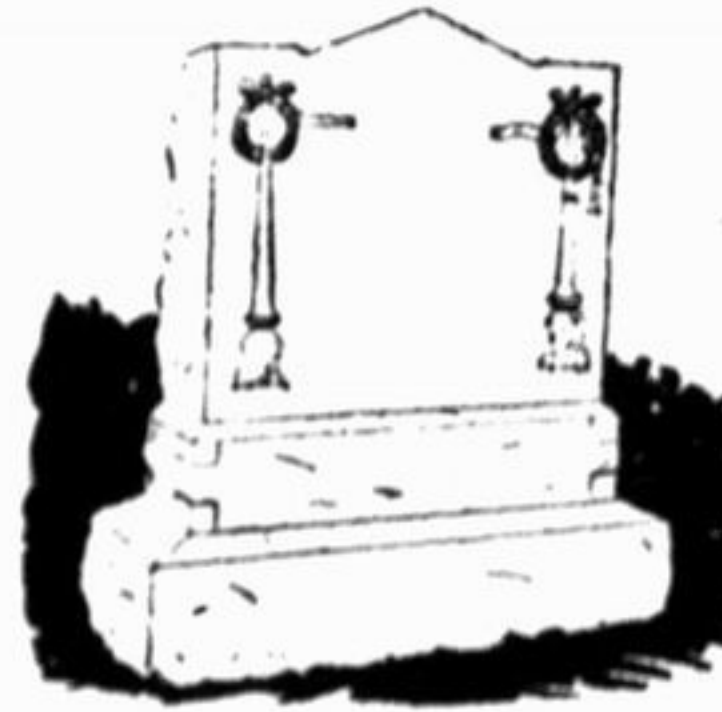
