American Legion Team Closes Successful Season by Showing Up Hinsdale Again.

By a ninth inning rally last Sunday the local American Legion baseball team, at Hinsdale, Swept the outfit from that suburb off its feet and pulled the game out of the fire, winning 7 to 4. By doing so they took three games from Hinsdale ciosing perhaps, the most successful season a baseball team from Downers Grove have ever seen. The score was 4 to 3 against them when Carpenter grounded to Graehling for the first out in the ninth. Theidel lost control and passed Mochel and Curtiss. Then followed the bombardment. Binder singled to right scoring Mochel and Curtiss. Shanabrook singled to left scoring Binder and Ehninger followed with a one base swat to center scoring Shanabrook. Hawkins and Nash struck out ending the scoring with four runs across the pas and another scalp, or the third piece of the same one, hanging from their belts. Hinsdale could do mothing in their half.

This is the third game played with Hinsdale this season and the locals copped them all and have clearly demonstrated their superiority over the losers in almost every department. Hinsdale has not shown any batting prowess before Ehninger's hurling although they seemed to like Bruns' pitching. They have a good fielding team with the possible exception of Luthin at third who made three errors in the last game, but the outfield is strong in that department. In two of the contests the scals appeared to have the best cam by far . In the first game at Hinsdale Herb shut them out 3-0 allowing only five hits and striking out eleven.



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
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
