EX-SERVICE MEN TO ATTEND MEMORIAL SERVICES

Will Meet at American Legion Rooms
Next Sunday Morning and
March to Church.

Next Sunday morning, November 7th, a memorial mass will be celebrated in St. Joseph's Church in the memory of the Downers Grove boys who gave up their lives in the world war.

At the invitation of the Rev. E. B. Goodwin, pastor of the church, members of the American Legion, ex-service men and women, and members of the families of the boys are especially invited to attend. The general public is also extended an invitation as the service is for every young man of the community, regardless of faith, who died while in the service of the United States.

American Legion members and ex-service men will meet at the Legion rooms next Sunday morning at 9:30. They will form in line and march to the church in a body. Uniforms are not necessary or requested and it is hoped by Legion leaders that a large representation of men who wore the khaki and the blue will attend.

The service is set for November 7 as this is the nearest to the 11, the anniversary of the signing of the armistice which ended the biggest bloodshed since the world began.

Downers Grove boys for whom the service is held, all of whom died while wearing the uniform of the United States are, Alexander Burns, John Pozdol, Marshall Statton, Henry Buschmann, LeRoy Dexter, Harry McAllister, John Bryan, Joseph Malek and Robert Riedy.

BELMONT PIONEERS LOST RELAY RACE TO WARRENVILLE BOYS

Ran Five and a Half Miles to Naperville in Thirty-Five Minutes Saturday Afternoon.

The two groups of boys organized by the County Y. M. C. A. at Belmont, near Downers Grove, and at Warrenton, known as "Pioneers" had a relay race last Saturday to Naperville. The race was won by Warrenton with the time recorded as thirty-five minutes, over a five and one half mile course.

Mr. Royal Morgan of Warrenton, who is leader of this group of Pioneers, assisted by Mr. E. Paver and Mr. Rohrbaugh, started the boys off from the A. E. & C. station at Warrenton at exactly 2:45. Each boy ran one-half mile and was then picked up by an auto and taken on into Naperville to see the finish. At exactly the same time, W. H. Richie, the County "Y" Secretary, was directing the starting and relaying of the Belmont boys, who started midway between Lisle and the Belmont schoolhouse. As the Belmont team was compelled to run two boys short, Morton and May each ran twice, and although a shorter distance was allowed the Belmont boys, the Warrenton group won by several minutes. Each team carried a message to Mayor Bowman of Naperville and when finally delivered into his hands, he read them aloud to the groups assembled there. The one sent from Belmont was as follows:

"To the Mayor of Naperville, Greeting. The Belmont Pioneers send you by special carrier this message of greeting with best wishes for you and the citizens of your city. May you continue to prosper and wield the influence which has always been so helpful to our beloved county.

Y. M. C. A. Boys of Belmont." After reading the messages, Mr. Bowman gave the boys a very fine little talk, emphasizing the value of such physical training and the moral value of such competitions.

Mr. Fischer, president of the Warrenton community club, has offered to give the Pioneers a fine American flag in recognition of their athletic prowess and this will be an added incentive to the boys for training as well as the further decoration of their meeting room.

The boys then all went down to the Y. M. C. A. Building at the invitation of Mr. Meyer, the general secretary, and after enjoying a good swim in the pool were feasted with doughnuts and hot chocolate.

The Warrenton boys further celebrated Halloween by a wicker roast in the woods northeast of the town and with Mrs. Morgan and some of their girl friends, enjoyed a jolly time around a big camp fire with songs and ghost stories.

These two groups of boys are following the program known as the Christian Citizenship Training Program which has been developed out of the experience of the past twenty-five years in work with boys. Already a number of boys have been chartered in order to determine their quality of balance and to enable them by this program to symmetrically develop their lives for Christian citizenship.

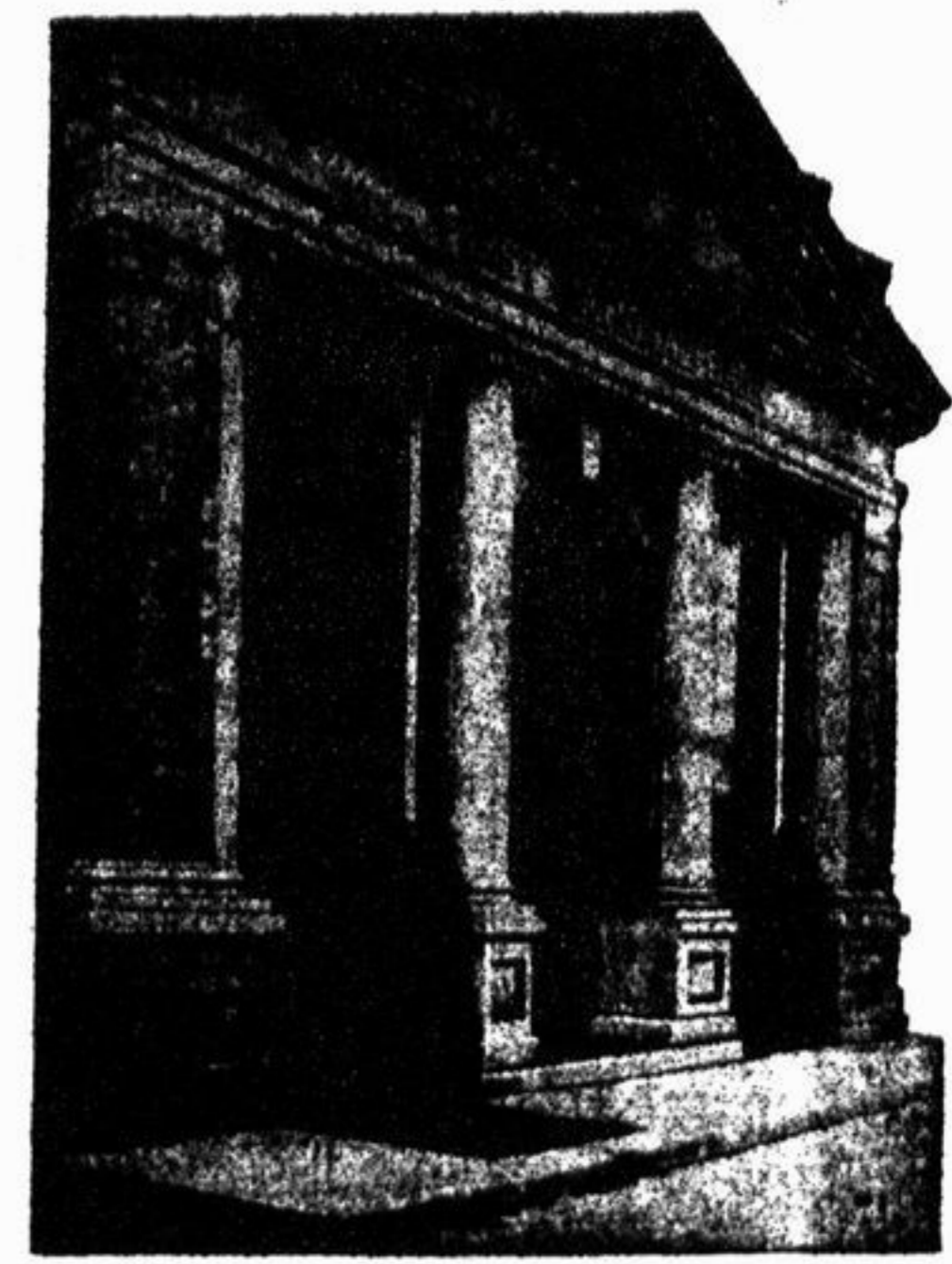
Glen Elynn plays here Saturday afternoon. Here's hoping that we win.
