Chicago Woman Doctor to Explain Reasons for Weighing and Measuring Children.

Some of the reasons why school children of Downers Grove have been weighed and measured this autumn will be elucidated before the Parent-Teacher Association next Thursday evening, November 18th. The Association has obtained as a lecturer Dr. Caroline Hedger who is connected with the Elizabeth McCormick Memorial Fund. Her subject will be "Malnutrition" and it is expected that some of the rather startling facts concerning this evil that have been discovered by sociological workers, will be elucidated in the talk.

Dr. Hedger has established a reputation as an authority in her line of work and the officers of the Association are urging all members of the organization, as well as any other citizens of Downers Grove who may be interested, to be at the High School hall next Thursday evening. The meetings of the association thus far have broken all its previous records and efforts are being made to keep up this standard. As a consequence some interesting programs are in prospect for the monthly gatherings and it is hoped that the organization will become truly valuable to the parents and teachers of the village.
