I have taken a ride in the sky. I went up in the flying machine over 6,000 feet and remained up for about thirty minutes. I must say that while it was my first fly—I would not have missed it for twenty years of my life—it is the only way to see the country as I rode many miles about the city in the few minutes I was up.

I was not afraid or in any way sick from the flight. The pilot who took me up said I was the oldest woman he had ever taken up.

Now the next thing for me to do will be to play golf.

LA GRANGE ELEVEN WAS EASY PICKIN'S FOR LEGION TEAM

Locals Won by One-Sided Score of 45 to 0 Last Sunday—Naperville Next.

Playing great football the American Legion eleven won by the lopsided score of 45-0 from the LaGrange team on the local grid last Sunday afternoon. The game was interesting in spite of the one-sidedness of the score the locals pulling off some wonderfully long forward passes.

In the first period LaGrange kicked to Downers, Curtiss received and ran the ball to LaGrange's 30 yard line; Grush thru the line for five yards; Griff around end for first down. Forward Curtiss to Vaughan incomplete; Cline around the end, no gain; Griff thru line, no gain; forward Curtiss to Bertolin for touchdown. Curtiss missed goal. Locals kicked to visitors, ball over goal brot in to 20 yard line; LaGrange held for downs, punted, Cline receiving and ran ball to 40 yard line; forward incomplete; Grush thru line for 5 yards; Cline thru line for first down; Grush thru line for touchdown which was out counted as time out whistle blew before he started.

Second period—LaGrange held for downs on 4 yard line; punted, Curtiss received and ran thru Lagrange for touchdown. Curtiss kicked goal. Downers Kicked to LaGrange who were held for downs and then punted Cline receiving and running ball to 50 yard line; ball worked to LaGrange 20 yard line and Curtiss took a wide end run for the third touchdown and then kicked goal. One more touchdown was put over in the first half by Cline.

Third period—Downers Kicked to LaGrange who came back and tore thru the Legion line for several first downs then punted to Cline who carried ball to LaGrange 30 yard line where a forward pass Curtiss to Mochel was responsible for another touchdown. Grush kicked goal.

Fourth period was a repetition of the others with only one touchdown by Grush.

Features of the game were the passing of Cline and Curtiss and intercepted forward pass by Brown and Curtiss' long kicks. Grush tore thru the LaGrange line apparently at will. Bertolin is there with the old speed and the entire team showed up as stars in the contest.

Naperville Sunday.

Sunday afternoon the team will play a return game with the Naperville eleven going to our neighboring village for the scrimmage. That this will be a great game is a foregone conclusion. The Legion eleven and Naperville played a few weeks ago a wonderful nothing to nothing draw

and both are now prepared to do or die. A big bunch of rooters are expected to go from here.

Thanksgiving Game.

Efforts are being made to bring the Hinsdale eleven to the Grove for a game Thanksgiving morning. Whether or not they will come is the burning question. If a game is secured it will be a good one as the teams are apparently evenly matched. Hinsdale has twice lowered the colors of the LaGrange eleven in the dust and the rivalry is keen.

He told the women some unpleasant truths of the way crippled and sick soldiers have been treated and brot home to them the advisability of the men who served in the ranks keeping up their War Risk Insurance.

Relating specific instances and not generalities, Mr. Linberg, brot home to them conditions in the various hospitals scattered about the country, either under government supervision or run directly by the United States. Following the speaker refresh-
