FOUND GUILTY, E. F. ADAMS IS FACING PRISON

Former Glen Ellyn Treasurer Seeks New Trial After Conviction on Forgery Charge

Elmer F. Adams, former village treasurer, was found guilty of forgery by a jury in the Circuit court, last Wednesday. The jury was out nearly four hours and the end came as a climax to a three-day trial.

The conviction carries with it an indeterminate term of from one to fourteen years. The convicted man will endeavor to nullify the verdict by fighting the case to the highest tribunal. His attorneys already have made motion for a new trial.

The conviction sets at naught the grave fears of many that the former village treasurer never would be brot to trial and convicted.

Powerful agencies have been at work in Glen Ellyn and elsewhere to prevent the trial. On the other hand, vital and cogent forces have been determined to see that Mr. Adams was tried.

C. W. Hadley, states attorney, and the village officials have been diligent in their efforts to see that the trial was held. Mr. Hadley, in fact, aided by Village Attorney Scott, gave more than ordinary care to the preparation of the case.

Wednesday was devoted to addresses to the jury, the state having closed its testimony, Tuesday afternoon. The defense put no witness on the stand. Neither did the defendant testify in his own behalf.

Attorneys for the defense put up the plea that the state had not proved

1. That there was a forgery. 2. That Adams had forged the spurious paper. 3. That Adams had forged the paper in DuPage county.

Attorney Scott's address to the jury was an able effort for the prosecution, and had a telling effect. He was followed by Joseph Reuss, for the defense, who read a number of supreme court decisions. Harvey Gansul, counsel for the defense, then made a plea to the sympathies of the jury.

The high spots of the trial, however, were hit by Hadley. His address

probably the last of his career as states attorney, is thought by many to have been the ablest and most eloquent of his public life. When he had finished, the court room seemed to be of the opinion that he had won the case for the state.

When the jury went out it was first believed the verdict would be returned within a few minutes. As time went on it looked better for the defendant and he began to take hope. However, disappointed he may have been when the verdict was returned, he did not show it.

Gansul had gone home and Mr. Reuss made the motion for a new trial.

Judge Irwin said he was too busy to hear arguments, but would set a date for such a hearing in a few days.—Glen Ellyn.

\$1050 FINE AND 60 DAYS IN JAIL FOR BOOTLEGGING

Wm. Hoffman Has Appealed to Circuit Court—Declares Act is Unconstitutional.

Judge S. L. Rathje has about as much sympathy for bootleggers in DuPage County as Federal Judge Landis has in his court in Chicago. William Hoffman, former West Chicago saloon keeper, found guilty in the county court last week of violating the search and seizure law, on seven counts, was sentenced by Judge Rathje last Wednesday morning to pay a fine of \$150 dollars on each of the seven counts and to spend sixty days in the county jail. It will cost Hoffman \$1050 in fines.

Hoffman's motion for a new trial was overruled as was also the motion to stay the execution of judgment. Hoffman has appealed the case to the circuit court, on the grounds that the search and seizure act is unconstitutional.
