DARING FEATS ARE SHOWN BY ANIMALS IN A COMEDY

If the play were the stage melodrama the patron would feel that he had a plentiful of thrills if the action included the death in an auto to rescue a child from the track of a speeding train, the throwing of a switch just in time to let the limited by, a release from a deserted cabin by burning the rope with a cigar, a leap from a hundred foot cliff to rescue a child in the water and a swim to the shore, a daring aeroplane ride, a leap from one machine to another and finally the arrest of the villains and the recovery of the ransom. Sounds like plenty of action, doesn't it, for the ordinary thriller?

That would be case if the characters were human. But in "Four Times Foiled" the first of the Chester Comedies which comes to the Dicke Theater on December 18th., the baby and the villains are real humans but all the melodramatic feats are performed by astonishing animal actors. The "Hero" is a monkey that surpasses anything that animal intelligence has ever registered; there is a horse that does the leap from the cliff, a dog that performs a rescue and a pig that has a lively bit to do. And then it is not a melodrama at all, but a deliciously human comedy, one that Broadway has declared the cleverest film that it has ever seen to such an extent that "Four Times Foiled" played longer in the heart of New York than any other two-reel comedy on record.
