JUNIOR RED CROSS REMEMBERS BOYS IN SMALLER HOSPITALS

"I knew that the Red Cross would not forget us." The speaker was an ex-service man. The scene was a small hospital where not even one spray of holly indicated that it was the day before Christmas. The woman had handed him candy, jelly and cigarettes from the Junior Red Cross and also an envelope containing some crisp bills and a greeting from the Good Fellows of the Tribune "to the man to whom we are so indebted." The Red Cross nurse had served at Camp Wadsworth and knew homesick boys at once. She hurried to a hospital where there was a Christmas tree for each ward, a holly wreath for each window and at least one present for each soldier. The Commanding Officer listened to her story

and sent a car to bring back the five soldiers to spend Christmas eve and to have Christmas dinner.

The Red Cross "does not forget," and it is the plan of the Junior Red Cross to remember the soldiers in the smaller hospitals every holiday during the year.

The Junior Red Cross has 12,000,000 school children in the United States training for citizenship. By the middle of January 300,000 in Chicago, Cook County, Lake and DuPage will be enrolled. No individual fee is asked, but the one who enrolls is pledged to do his share in making America a happier place in which to live.

was no question but what the petition was presented in time but the Council in the case mentioned refused to call an election in compliance with the petition.

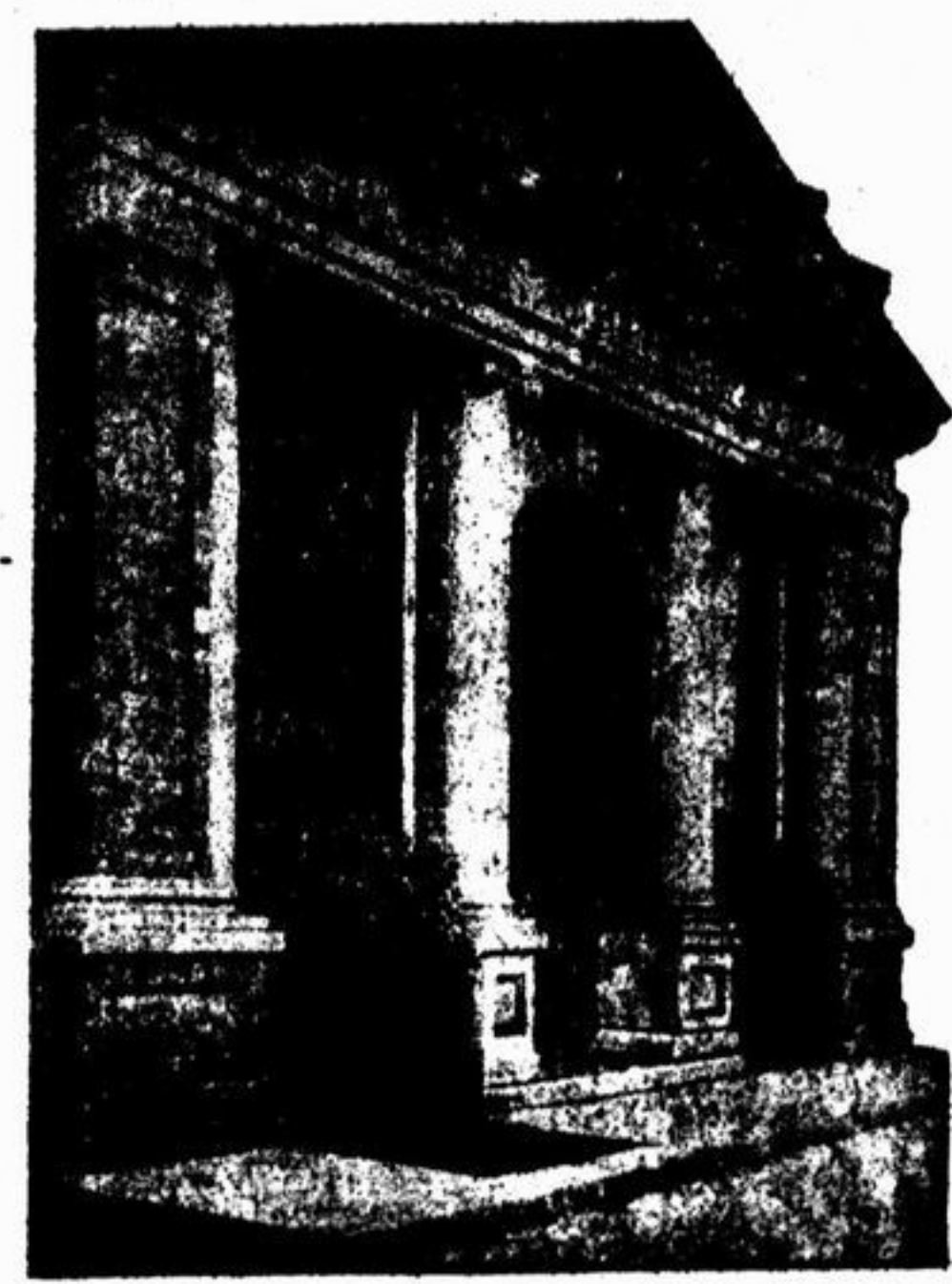
In view of the very close question involved in our case it was considered advisable by me that the Village concede that the petition was filed in time. It will, therefore, be seen that the question whether or not the Village had a right to pass an ordinance of this kind, or whether or not such an ordinance would be sustained by the Supreme Court, was not involved at all. We met specially for the purpose of determining whether or not the petition was filed in time and it was thought expedient and best for all parties concerned that the petition be considered as having been presented to the Council within thirty days.

Your article in the issue of December 17th, therefore, was misleading, unfair and did not state the facts nor even the point involved.

OPEN LONG STRETCH OF CONCRETE ROAD ON DECEMBER 23RD

Mason City, Ill., Dec. 23rd.—The longest stretch of paved road that has yet been completed under the Federal Aid Act was formally dedicated and opened to the public here today. The completed pavement is a link in the Chicago-St. Louis highway, extending from Sparland to Chatham, a distance of 117 miles. The entire road is paved with concrete and along this magnificent rural boulevard lie the cities of Springfield and Peoria, as well as a score or more of smaller towns and villages and hundreds of farms in what is one of the richest farming districts in the world and special significance is attached to the completion of this road, since it is the first large project to be completed of the 4,800 miles of hard surfaced roads that are to form a connected and statewide system of highways in Illinois.
