**FREE EDUCATIONAL MOTION PICTURES FOR OUR SCHOOLS**

A Wee Memorial to Master Paul Brownson Dum Accepted by Authorities.

Downers Grove is to step to the front in the matter of Visual Education, by the introduction at once of Motion Pictures in our Schools, the Board of Education and Dr. Goodwin having accepted with thanks the offer by Mr. Dum of the free use of a Safety Standard machine, to be placed under Miss Morse of our local Kindergarten, as Trustee under the conditions as follows: That it shall be at the service of the Kindergarten for one day each week, one day for St. Joseph's school, and three days for the Public Schools—Of the latter, the High School having it a day and the North Side and South Side Grades a day each, and while to take care of the cost of the films the plan of charging 2 cents a pupil was suggested, which would be more than ample to cover same, it seemed to be the sentiment that instead it would be better to raise the money via some evening entertainments, not only to reimburse for the small outlay for this, but especially to HELP CREATE A FUND FOR THE EXTENSION OF THE MOVEMENT.

Both Dr. Goodwin and Mr. Snapp having expressed a desire for the installation at the earliest feasible moment, of a Standard Motion Picture equipment. It is only a question of time until Motion Pictures will be a part of the Teaching Work in our Schools, if possible even more directly functioning in this particular, for all Grades, than does the Laboratory for the High School, and with a Village, the pere of any of our "Q" towns, for instance, it is cause for congratulation, we feel, that Downers Grove shall be THE FIRST to give its school children the enjoyment of such up-to-the-minute advantages.

We trust, therefore, that the well-wishers of our Community will be disposed to open wide their purse strings to all endeavors to promote its success, and particularly in view of the fact that with certain assurances Mr. Dum has given the authorities, EVERY PENNY WILL THUS SECURE THE LARGEST MEASURE OF VALUE.

The immediate impetus in this direction is due to the "calling Home" of little Paul Brownson Dum, whose father out of thankfulness for the joys given to Paul Brownson during the one and one-half years he was privileged to attend our local Kindergarten, as also in reciprocity for the kindnesses and courtesies extended them, in such bereavement, wished to do something in memory of his little "Pal," and for the reasons given in his letter of last week he chose this medium of Motion Pictures. In this connection it will be of especial interest for our readers to be advised that "THE PAUL BROWNSON MACHINE," which will be used to inaugurate in our schools this modern "Fairy Godmother" for instructional purposes, is one that the National Board of Fire Underwriters have duly labeled, "Enclosing Booth not Required," since it uses exclusively a slow-burning film, of a 28 millimeter width, instead of the one of 35 millimeters that is the Theatrical Standard, so, parents can feel perfectly safe, with its use un-

restricted in any of the class-rooms

and the mechanism is so very simple that its operation can be looked after by any of the teachers. The service will consist of 5 reels per week, as may be selected by Mr. Snapp, assisted by Dr. Goodwin and Miss Morse, as may be desired, Saturday to be "exchange day," the films being gotten personally in Chicago, or by Parcels Post, if preferred—and there are over 1,500 films from which to choose, embracing the following classes:

1. Travel, Hunting, Manners and Customs;
2. Industries, Forestry, Agriculture;
3. Popular Science, Natural History;
4. Topical and War;
5. Fairy and Trick Scenes;
6. Comic Scenes;
7. Vaudeville;
8. Comedies;
9. Dramas;
10. Religious and Biblical Scenes;
11. Reconstructed History;
12. Military Sports;
13. Detective Stories; and
14. Animated Cartoons.

This "Safety Standard" machine and film service is the same thing in use by a number of the wealthy HOMES of Chicago, including Mr. Joy Morton of near here, and the Paul Brownson machine happens to be the identical model they all have—the one manufactured by the Pathe Freres, of Paris, France—the film service being from their Library of Educational Films, the largest in the world. New York City schools have adopted same for the past seven years, with an Annual appropriation of thousands of dollars for sustaining it, and Gary has two teachers who now give their entire time to showing the pictures in the different buildings each week.

The program of "Pittures" in Downers Grove will start next week.

**SCOUTS TO SWIM TWICE A MONTH IN HIGH SCHOOL TANK**

Turn of Local Boys Next—Competent Instructors Will Teach the Sport.

Arrangements have been completed with the J. Sterling Morton High School whereby all the members of the Boy Scouts of the West Suburban District have an opportunity to swim twice a month. The School have allowed them to come there the first and third Thursdays of every month and use the excellent pool for an hour and one half. This, however, is provided the Scouts are accompanied by one of their leaders. As there is not room for all the 500 Scouts to go at one time the Executive has arranged a schedule and they attend in relays. The Scouts of Brookfield, LaGrange and Riverside have had a swim and the next turn is for the Scouts of Downers Grove. They will leave Downers Grove at 3:39 and get off the train at Clyde and walk over to the school. This is a great opportunity for them. At these swims, as in all activities of the Scout program, instruction is given the Scouts. It is the instruction on the essential things of life that is not found in books. No volume is large enough to teach a boy to swim if he does not have opportunities similar to those given by the Scout Program.

There are two grades in water sports recognized by the Scouts: Swimming Merit Badge and Life Saving Merit Badge.

The Swimming Merit Badge requirements are:

1. Swim 100 yards.
2. Dive properly from the surface.
3. Demonstrate breast, crawl, and side strokes.
4. Swim 50 yards on back.

At a glance we see that the instruction is complete. If every boy were a Scout and learned this one requirement many lives would be saved every year.

The requirements for the Merit Badge in Life Saving is much more advanced. It means that the Scout is not only able to save himself but is also able to save others. They are:

1. Be able to tell what to do with an apparently drowned person, and demonstrate the Sylvester method and the Shaffer method of artificial respiration.
2. Go down in at least seven feet of Water, from the surface and bring up an object twelve inches or more in diameter, weighing not less than ten pounds.
3. Swim twenty yards carrying a person of his own weight:
  - a. By a two hand carry using feet only for propulsion.
  - b. By a one arm carry using side stroke.
4. Dressed in trousers, coat and shoes swim 50 yards and undress before touching shore.
5. In deep water demonstrate three approved methods of releasing the death grip.

If all our boys were Scouts and had this opportunity to learn to save others there would not be the tragedies in our community that happen from time to time largely because the people never had the opportunity now offered by the Boy Scout Program.
