When air is taken in through the ashpit door a large part of it is burned while passing through the grate firebed and there is not enough air left to consume the coal gases in the combustion chamber. These gases pass up the chimney only half burned.

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The hotter the air taken into the firebox the less heat it will abstract from the burning gases.

This ideal condition can be obtained by attaching the King Koal Carburetor to the inside of your furnace firing door. The air is heated to a high temperature as it passes through the carburetor and shoots out through several tiny holes. The number of holes vary according to the size of the firepot and the kind of coal being used. This hot air mixes with the carbon and creates a gas fire over the coal fire. The ashpit door and the pipe damper are kept closed except just after fresh firing.

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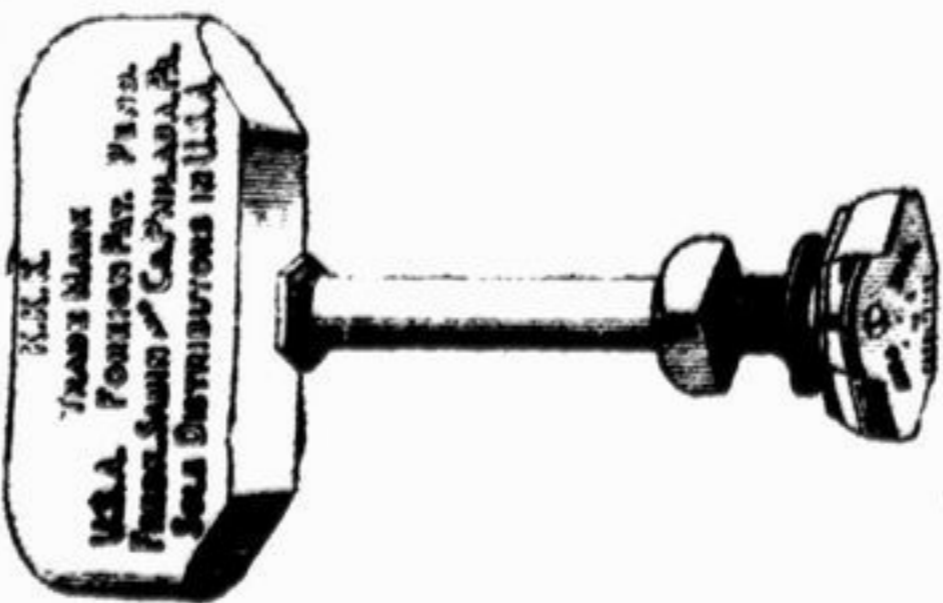

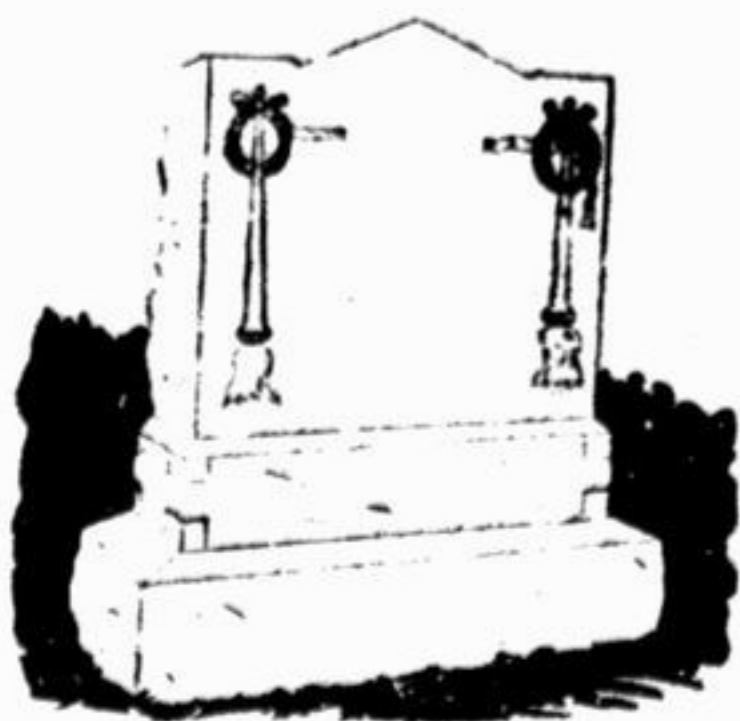
