LOCAL LIBRARY IS LEADER IN CIRCULATION PER CAPITA

Record for 1920 Shows Local People Read More Than "High Brow" Suburbs.

The records of the past year's work of the Downers Grove Library show that its circulation for the past year has been slightly over 18,000. This is a per capita circulation of approximately 5.3, this means that if every man, woman and child in Downers Grove had availed themselves of the privileges of the Library each one would have read 5.3 books during the year just past. This per capita circulation is larger than that of any of the surrounding suburban towns and even exceeds that of the "high brow" North Shore suburbs of Evanston and Wilmette. Even Chicago, with its large Public Library and its many branches, is forced to bow to Downers Grove in actual results accomplished, per capita circulation.

The local library is ideally situated to be of the greatest service to Downers Grove readers and students and its reading rooms are pleasant, well lighted and quiet. At present there are on the shelves 4,138 volumes and 36 periodicals can be found on its reading tables. These many sources of pleasure, knowledge and thought are available to every person in Downers Grove and the Library Board is very anxious that every one avail themselves of this opportunity and keep Downers Grove listed as one of the best read suburbs of Chicago.

At present the Library has 1,205 card subscribers who have the privilege of taking home books from the shelves absolutely free, these people are the ones who have made our town so well read. If you haven't a card, get one—it's a pretty good class to join.

Each year the Library is able to place 265 new volumes on the shelves and this just keeps the number of books at its present level as about the same number are worn out each year. The sets of books by the great authors, are the ones that were used in the old library and are somewhat the worse for wear. With their present means the Library Board sees no way to replace these or to add

materially to the number of volumes on the shelves. After such a good year lets get behind and see what can be done.

JR. HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASS'N. HAS BEEN FORMED

Ten Basket Ball Teams Organized in 6th, 7th and 8th Grades for Tournament.

The boys of the 6th, 7th and 8th grades of the Public Schools have organized ten basket ball teams and under the direction of Mr. Geeting are running off a tournament on Saturday mornings between 9:30 and 12. The 6th, 7th and 8th grade class teams have also scheduled games with corresponding grades of the Naperville school to be played here on Saturday, February 5th.

Because of these activities the need was greatly felt for some form of an organization to promote more and better athletics as well as true sportsmanship. With this in mind Mr. Geeting called a meeting of all the boys and girls of the North and the South Side upper grades and put the matter up to the pupils to see what the feeling was and they gave a unanimous decision that they wanted an organization and would support it. They voted unanimously that no one could play on any team that failed in more than one subject in his work. They organized what is hoped will become a permanent organization to be known as the "Junior High School Athletic Association" and elected the following officers for the remainder of the year.
