MAYOR BARBER NAMES DELEGATES TO ROAD CONGRESS

Big Convention to be Held in the Coliseum, Chicago, in February.

Mayor William Hale Thompson of Chicago has asked Mayor Barber to appoint three delegates to represent Downers Grove officially at a big nation-wide Good Roads Congress and National Good Roads Show to be held at the Coliseum in Chicago, February 9 to 12 next. Delegates will attend from every section of the United States and Canada and from Cuba, Porto Rico, Hawaii and Alaska.

William Bowler, Charles Roe and C. H. Staats have been named by Mayor Barber to be the delegates from here. It is expected that they will attend nearly every session to get in on the road building dope which such a gathering of men should disseminate. That the problem of good roads interests everyone now-a-days is sure, and for this reason the gatherings can have nothing but good effect on the road building program of any community.

The Congress and show will be held under the auspices of the American Road Builders' Association, the national organization of government, state, county and city highway officials, engineers, contractors and manufacturers of road building machinery and materials.

It is called for the purpose of discussing the problems confronting the highway officials, the economical expenditure of vast appropriations totalling more than one billion dollars recently provided by states and counties for highway improvement in the United States, and up-to-date methods of highway construction and maintenance.
