

TO THE PUBLIC

Owing to the present abnormal fuel and labor conditions we have been obliged to shut down our coke oven plant.

Carburetted Water Gas of the same heating value as the coke oven gas is being distributed now.

Carburetted Water Gas is sold in practically all large cities and will give satisfactory service if the gas appliances are properly adjusted for it. It is heavier than coke oven gas and requires less air for complete combustion; therefore, air shutters on stove and light burners should be adjusted as follows:

Close the shutter and test the flame. If it is yellow there is not enough air being admitted and the shutter should be opened farther.

If it pops back there is too much air being admitted and the shutter should be closed slightly.

Perfect combustion is indicated by a sharp blue green flame.

Gas lamps may be adjusted by closing the air porte and then turning on just enough gas to make the entire mantle a brilliant white.

Try to adjust your own appliances, but if satisfactory results are not obtained call our office.
