She was honored by all in the community and held in highest esteem by those who were associated with her in the many channels of service for her useful life.

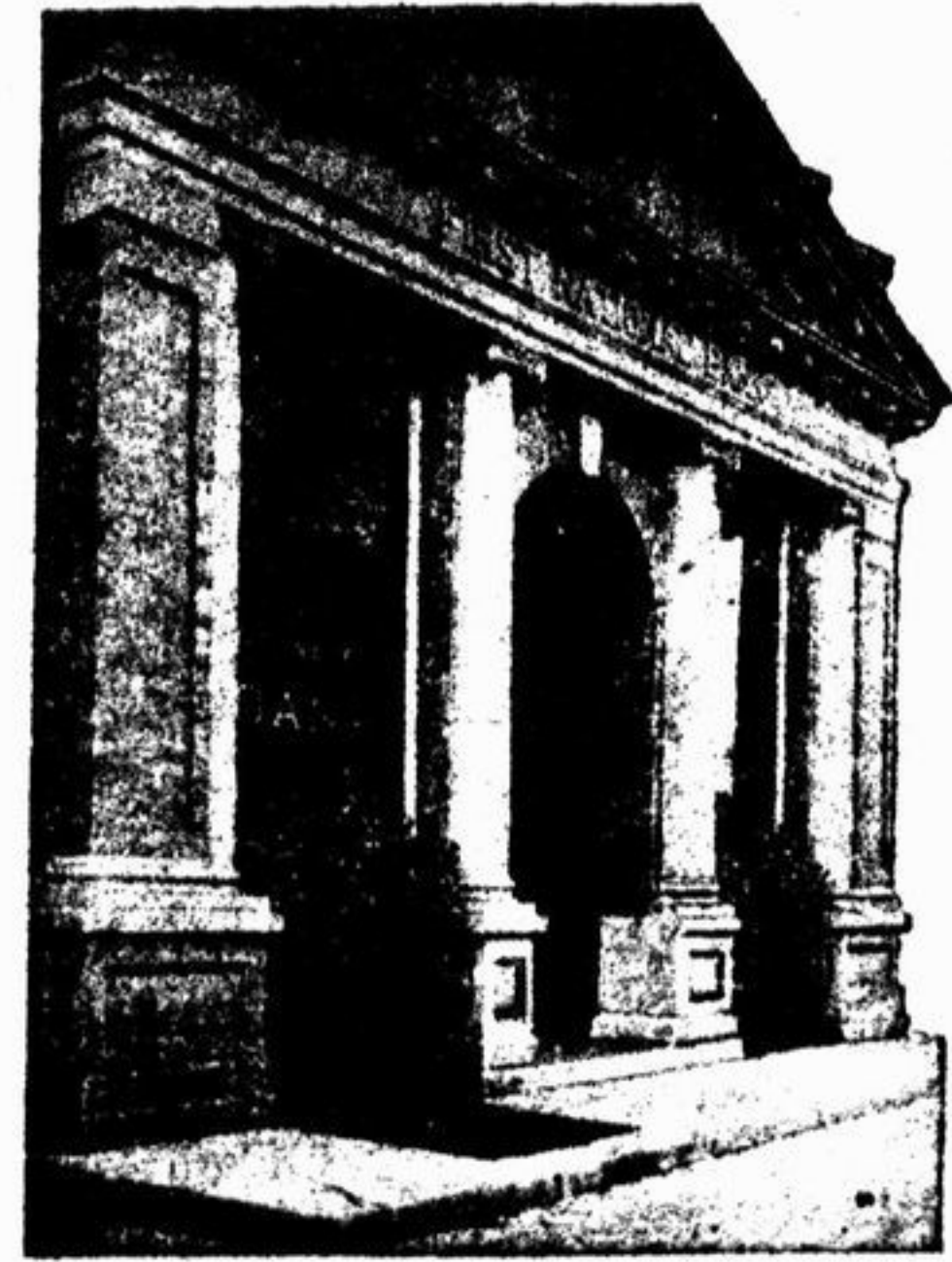
She died with firm faith in her Saviour. She, if any, knew what it means to trust God. And now she is gone—but the memory of her life and the influence of her works will long live after her.
