This evening the team goes to Blue Island. Next week they will be playing in the state tournament at Elgin. Remember March 7th.

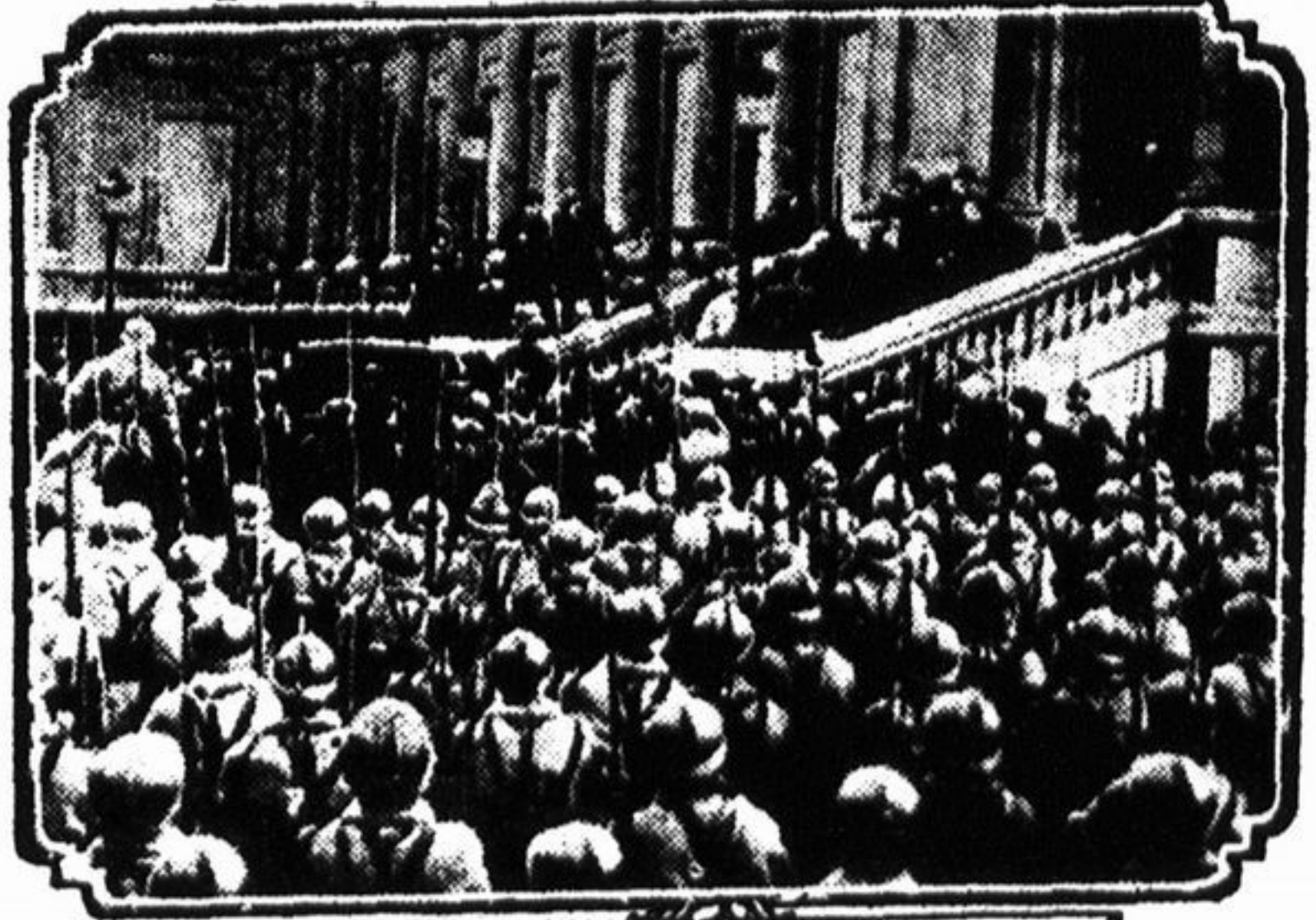

COMMUNITY HIGH SCHOOL SITUATION WAS TALKED OVER

Present School Board Authorized to Appoint Committee to Spread Propaganda

A small, but representative, gathering of local people met at Library Hall last Sunday afternoon at the invitation of the Community Welfare League to talk over the Township High School proposition.

No regular speaker was present, the object of the meeting being merely to clear up several points which were a little clouded and everyone was invited to ask as many questions as possible.

A resolution, which follows, was presented by M. W. Mills and adopted by the meeting. It authorizes the school board to select a committee to disseminate information regarding the project. To scatter the necessary propaganda that local people and those of the surrounding territory will understand just how much we need this school and the benefits accruing from it.

RESOLUTION
"WHEREAS, A petition praying for the creation of the Downers Grove Township High School District is now being circulated; and whereas, this petition has already been signed or approved by a large number of our citizens; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, That it is the sense of this meeting that the Community High School is the present greatest need of this District, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we respectfully suggest that the President of the Board of Education of Downers Grove appoint the members of the Board of Education and six other citizens of the proposed district to constitute an Executive Committee, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That said Executive Committee should have power to appoint sub-committees and select so many other citizens to cooperate with them as in their judgment may be necessary."

In speaking for the resolution Mr. Mills said that many people were not aware of the good that a high school of this kind could do nor were they conversant with the facts in the case. "In order to educate the voters a house-to-house canvass by men who do know it is necessary," concluded the speaker.

Walter Curtis, who was a resident of Hinsdale when that village voted in the township high school and who was a member of the first board of education to control its destinies, spoke very heartily in favor of the proposition. He said it was the making of the Hinsdale School system and the same thing would work here.

The error most people have about the whole proposition is that it is a township affair and Hinsdale would have a vote in the matter. This is wrong. The proposed district does not follow township lines and in fact includes parts of York and Lisle townships. What is to be done is to create a new high school district. The present District 58 would not change but would be part of the new. The taxation from the new district would all apply for high school purposes and the present tax revenue would be used for the primary grades in the various districts covered. This would give the District 58 Board all the money for use in grades up to the eighth thereby not only improving our high school facilities but our grade school also.

And the tax would not go up such an awful lot at that!

COUNTY NURSE INSPECTED ALL LOCAL SCHOLARS

Made Report of Defects in Children Examined to Local School Board

We are giving this week the report of our grade school inspection recently made by our County Nurse. There are many pupils as will be seen by the report, with minor defects, and we trust each one will have such attention as is needed. During the next years the county cannot afford to have any preventable illness.

Most of the defects discovered in the examination are minor, but should have immediate attention in order that the boy or girl may develop into the strongest possible man or woman.

It is foolish to tell a child to breathe through his nose if he is suffering from enlarged adenoids. The adenoids must come out first. It is useless to impress upon a child the necessity of thoroughly chewing his food, if his teeth are carious and deficient.

Eye strain frequently means loss of appetite, resulting in malnutrition. Each child has been given a card listing just what is needed in his respective case, and we trust attention will be given as needed.
