### BOYS WOUNDING SONG BIRDS SAYS MRS. E. G. LEMON

The Sling Shot and BB Gun Taking Annual Toll of Feathered Friends of Ours.

Many complaints have been brot to me the past week of boys in different parts of town using sling shots and BB guns. The boys no doubt are shooting at sparrows, but unfortunately hit many other birds, as several robins and grackles have been picked up with broken legs and also wings in the vicinity where these boys have been. A close watch is being kept and names taken.

We have state laws protecting our birds and the game warden of this district has asked for reports on this matter, and I am sorry indeed that a report of this kind has to be sent from our town where we have so much to be proud of and should take a pride in protecting all the things that we are privileged to enjoy. The birds are surely one of the greatest joys that come to us in the spring time. They must be protected even tho the enforcement of law be resorted to.

Very few children and grown people too for that matter, know the difference between the English sparrow that is a little pest and the 30 or 40 other sparrows that do so much good in our gardens and fields, by destroying insects and noxious weed seeds. The sling shot and BB gun becomes a menace in the hands of a child. Use the sparrow trap if the English

sparrows are proving too much of a nuisance. You can then liberate all other birds and destroy the sparrow but be very sure it is an English sparrow you are destroying.

I have been requested to present this matter to the public and ask the cooperation of all. There are at least 50 men and women that are banding together to see that the birds are protected or at least given a fair show.

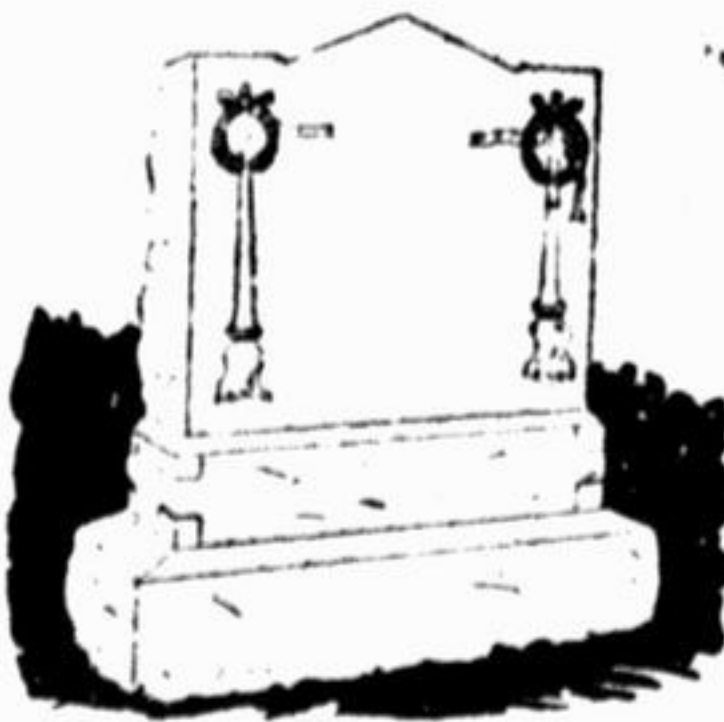
