they are Jews perhaps, but these particular Jews have to be "Hit with a Club" in order to make them understand—they are exceedingly obtuse; and only a man of Mr. Ford's financial independence could afford thus to awaken the antagonism of a Race with so large a control over the "purse strings." And, by the way, How some of them are howling!

It is with a feeling of relief, however, that we can turn to a phase of this question that doesn't concern the abuse of Motion Pictures, but a plan for drawing on the apparently limitless resources of this modern Fairy Godmother in the interest of the Public Welfare—switching from the sordid story of the use for "commercialized amusement" to one that seems a sort of Aladdin Tale in Modern Version; and it will possess all the more charm since it really begins with a ten year old orphan boy who lived with an unsympathetic Uncle at Lockport, Illinois, but who ran away from "home" to Lemont, where he caught a cattle car to New York City, was cared for enroute by some kindly-disposed fellows in charge of the stock, and once in the big city put into operation suggestions they had given him as to how to "earn his board and keep"—Dr. Francis Holley, the founder and director now of the famous International Film Distribution Organization, the Bureau of Commercial Economics, of Washington, D. COUNTY PAID \$41,776.50 IN AUTO TAXES FOR 1920

State Estimate Says 4,096 Cars Are Owned by Residents of the County.

A statement issued by the office of Louis L. Emmerson, Secretary of State, on March 16th, regarding automobile licenses shows that DuPage County paid \$41,776.50 into the state treasury for auto fees during the year 1920. The increase over 1919 was \$18,896.51, almost double the amount. The report estimates that 4,096 cars were owned by DuPage County people in 1920 and 9,583 in 1919, an increase of only 513. The additional fees and the buying of higher horse powered cars is responsible for the big increase in the total fees.

Out of the eight counties nearest in population size to DuPage County, only two of them have a lower auto fee total than ours, Jackson and Morgan. The other six, Hancock, De Kalb, Christian, Iroquois, McHenry and Whiteside, all paid more fees than ours. The total receipts for the entire state were \$5,893,586.02. Of this amount Cook County, with almost half the state's population, paid less than a quarter of the total. The amount paid by Cook County was \$1,846,233.70.

This would seem to indicate that even the greatest proportion of wealth is centered in Cook County, yet its distribution is far from even. That the wealth outside of Cook is more evenly distributed.
