**Credit Basis of Business But Must Not be Abused**

WITHOUT credit we could not do a large volume of business. We are told by financiers that ninety per cent of business is done with some sort of credit, checks, drafts, notes and accounts. We have almost sixty dollars money circulation per capita, but with only cash as exchange, our business transactions would be restricted. So credit is vital.

Confidence is the basis of credit. Without confidence there can be little credit. When you borrow money at the bank or buy goods at a store the man with whom you do business must have confidence in your honesty and ability to pay, otherwise he cannot extend the credit. This is true of merchants, manufacturers, farmers, wage earners, in fact all classes of people and in all lines of business.

To establish and maintain credit we must meet our obligations promptly. Past due notes and accounts are mighty poor assets; in fact they cannot be considered usable assets. Prompt payment establishes credit, but the citizen who does not pay when he agrees to destroys his credit.

The best asset one can have is the reputation of being prompt pay. Especially is this true of the young man just starting in life's work. The rule applies with equal force to the citizen with property. No man who gives credit waits to apply the law to collect. That also destroys credit and strains friendship.

Merchants are often obliged through the carelessness or dishonesty of persons to whom they extend credit to carry overdue bills. To do this they must often borrow money and pay interest while their true customers pay no interest. That's not fair and it's not sound business. It also adds to the expense of doing business.

Prompt payment keeps the wheels of business turning; slow payments bring on stagnation and hard times. If you want good times pay when you agree to. Money in circulation is what counts. A slow paying community is a poor place to do business. Slow paying people soon lose credit—their very best asset.

These rules apply just as forcefully to the retail lumber business as in any other line. Prompt payment of lumber bills helps make healthy conditions and helps to reduce lumber prices. Lumber dealers can no more afford to carry past due notes or accounts than can other business men. It takes money to carry on business and lumber dealers can use only live assets.
