HINSDALE THRIFT EXHIBITION PLANS ARE INTERESTING

Woman's Club of Neighboring Village Sponsors Show April 13, 14, and 15.

On Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, April 13, 14, and 15, there is to be held in Guild Hall, Hinsdale, under the auspices of the Hinsdale Woman's Club, a Thrift Exhibition.

This will be of particular interest to public and nearby villages, and a cordial invitation is extended to the public of Downers Grove to enjoy the benefits of this exhibition.

Thursday, April 14, is given over as Neighborhood Day. On the afternoon of Thursday a Beef Cutting Demonstration, conducted by Jean Prescott Adams, together with a lecture on meat cuts and food values will be given.

A large number of labor saving devices will be on exhibition in the various booths allotted for that purpose. Many of the largest manufacturers in the country have taken space and are preparing large and complete demonstrations.

An excellent luncheon will be served at noon and dinner at night—fifty cents for luncheon and one dollar for dinner—general admission of fifteen cents for the afternoon and twenty-five cents for the evening.

This is without doubt the largest individual effort ever made in this locality to place before the home owners a complete demonstration of modern labor-saving devices for the home.

Ample provision has been made to anticipate a large number of people who will doubtless want to avail themselves of the opportunity to attend.

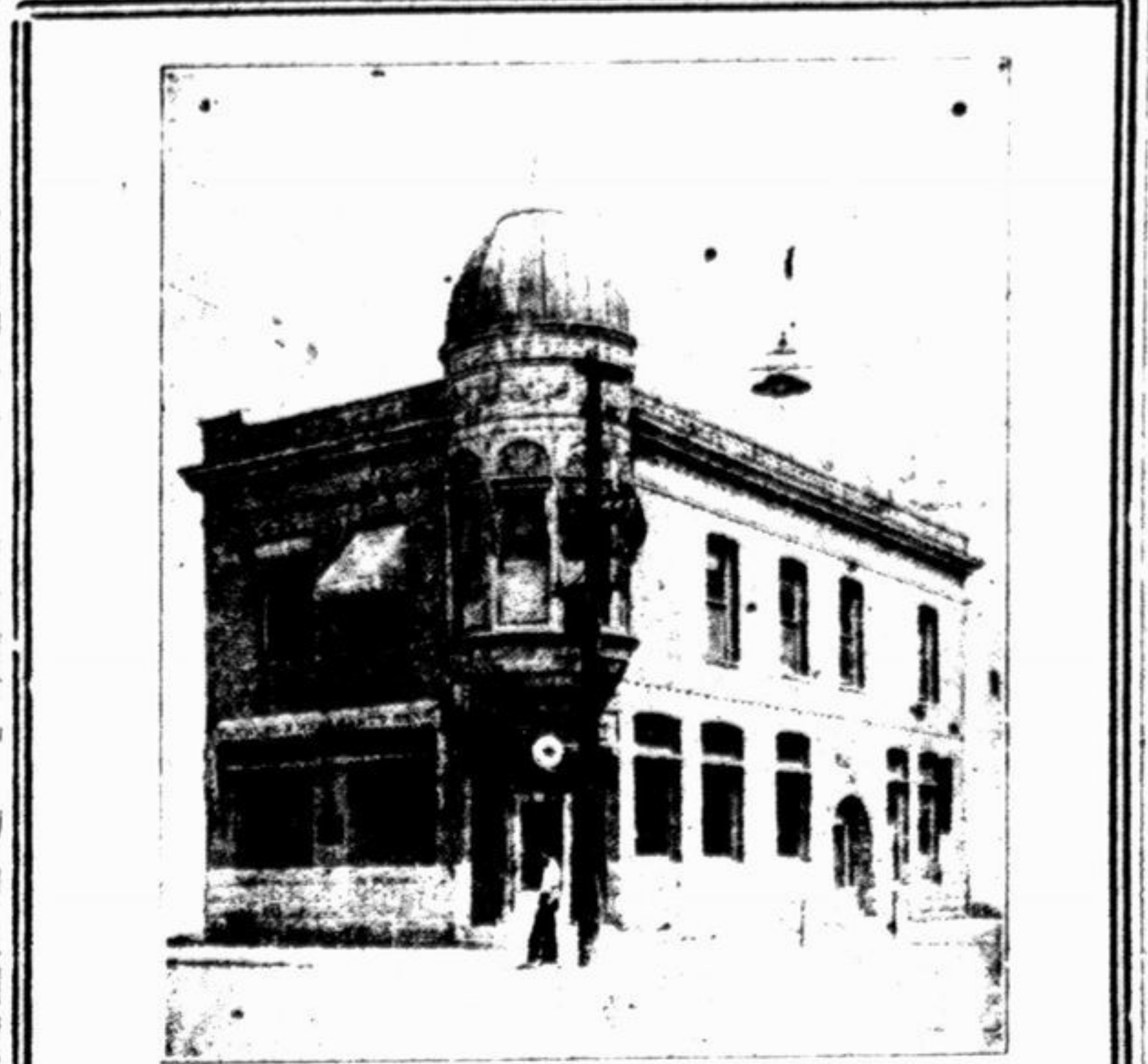
