Marguerite Clark in "Scrambled Wives"

One of the most ingenious stage sets ever devised for a motion picture was employed by Marguerite Clark in the production of "Scrambled Wives," the First National attraction which is coming to the Dicke Theatre on Thursday and Friday, April 21 and 22. In one scene the petite star, wearing a Berda mask made famous by Margaret Severn of the Greenwich Village Follies, gives a doll dance on a Japanese stage set, with waterfalls and snow-capped mountains in the background. The "waterfalls" which pass over a ledge in a steady stream are in reality a thick column of soap suds. In a huge vat back-stage the soap suds were electrically heated to the boiling point and forced over the top by a special mechanical contrivance. Colored motion picture photography was employed in the taking of this scene, and, with the set carried out in chocolate, orange, white and blue, a most striking effect is said to have been obtained, the glistening waterfalls being an outstanding feature.
