AMERICAN LEGION AND LOCAL POLITICS

To awaken and stimulate a keener interest on the part of all citizens in the candidates for office of the smaller communities, to bring the merchants and the business men to a realization that they should give the community the advantages of their experience and judgement to break down the lethargic attitude so general toward community elections.

is one of the principle aims of the American Legion. With the arousing of civic pride and an increased sense of personal obligation, it is most certain that all communities will reflect in a marked degree the benefits and advantages of the many working for its best interest as compared with the few.

A clause in the preamble of the Constitution of the Legion reads, "To inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation." According to its by-laws no man may hold office in the Legion while holding an elective position in the community. This, however, does not mean that every Legionnaire must eschew local politics because he is either an officer or potential candidate for some Legion post. Quite the contrary: If he realizes his sense of individual obligation to the community, he must of necessity take the interest in local advancement which spells progress.

And it is only right and proper that he should. Many people seem to have forgotten that practically every able-bodied man today between the ages of 25 and 35 was a member of the armed forces of the United States in the late war and is therefore eligible to membership in the Legion. Of course there were many more older men and some younger men but it must not be forgotten that this entire organized body of men represent a large proportion of our future captains.

It is therefore evident that while Legion members may not as a body interest themselves in the candidacy of some person for office it is their manifest duty to foster civic pride, and as individuals to see that none but the men of highest qualifications hold office.

Therefore, they should set an example to the community at large in registering at their polling places, and when election day comes turn out and cast their votes, allowing nothing to hinder them from fulfilling this duty.

The managers of political machines desire nothing better than a light vote as it is so much easier to control elections when the rank and file of the voters stay away from the polls. The attitude of the Legion in stimulating its membership to voting activity should be one of considerable advantage to any community as it tends to increase the number of votes cast and thereby assists in breaking down the oldtime political machines.

The Legion looks upon calls for local office holding and the casting of the ballot as similar to calls for volunteers in times of national stress. It is their obvious duty to set an example to the citizens in any community as there can be no question raised as to the patriotic impulse which impels them to function as 100 per cent American citizens.

ed in the future growth and development of the old town we all love so well. As one of our well known citizens put it to us Tuesday morning, "I can't see how anyone having the good of the future of Downers Grove at heart can work or vote against the annexation of territory. If they do, they must be short-sighted people and not really interested in seeing Downers Grove take its rightful place among other communities of the region."

The petition asking the Village to annex the territory is now being signed. Roughly it takes in the territory starting at Fairview avenue and the southeast corner of section 8, which is about a half mile south of the "7" run east to a point about a quarter of a mile east of Westmont, then north to the Plank road west to a point north of the west village limits, south on that line to the village limits, east on Chicago avenue to Fairview and then south to the place of beginning. This would bring into the village many desirable pieces of property, already improved with modern dwellings. All that territory lying between Chicago avenue and the Plank road and east to Fairview should have been within the limits long ago. It is Downers Grove in everything but voting power.

If you are skeptical about voting to annex this territory when the proposition comes to a vote, don't simply mark a cross against it. Before you do anything which will injure the future of the village have a talk with someone who KNOWS what can and what cannot be done. Don't take the unsupported word of some of our best crepe hangers on the subject.
