SOME REMARKS ON CHICKENS

In The Reporter of April 15th, you extend an invitation to give our views on things for the betterment of the community.

In the first place we should all have garbage cans, a place to put them and a man to carry them away at stated intervals.

In the second place there should be inside toilets in every house.

In the third place—Chickens. Of course, I realize that everyone has a right to keep chickens, but where houses are near together if everyone kept chickens, in the hot weather there would be a very disagreeable odor. If all knew and had time to care for them properly it would be better. But so few take the time, either they do not know or they do not care. A coop where the chickens roost wants white washing with lime as often as twice a year. The yard needs frequent spading over. There should be a corner with plenty of sand, mixed with lime and wood ashes, where they can wallow. The nests, where the hen sits to hatch her brood, needs especial care to keep her from the chicks.

Green grass should be thrown in every day, so much garbage thrown to the chickens causes a bad odor, especially in hot weather. I knew a man who kept a great many chickens on a farm and would not let them have anything from the table except the clean bread crumbs.
