DAMAGE DONE BY SATURDAY'S WIND AND SNOW

Trees Blown Over and Fruit Again Hit by Freeze—Telephone Wires Were Down.

A blizzard, driven by a fifty-mile-an-hour wind, completely engulfed this section of the country, starting in the early morning hours last Saturday. So great was the force of the wind that large limbs of trees and in several cases, the trees themselves, were blown over. In at least one instance a window was shattered by the force of the blast, that in the old Miller building on West Railroad street. The snow in and near Downers Grove was mostly sleet which melted almost as fast as it fell, although there was a coating of snow on the ground Saturday morning. The farther north one traveled, however, the worse was the snow. At Lombard there was almost six inches of the fleecy stuff and just a few miles north of that there was enough to stop trains, autos and nearly all other means of transportation. Wires, both telephone and telegraph, were down and communication on the Northwestern could not be had farther west on the main line than West Chicago. Sunday morning the thermometer was as low as twenty-one degrees above zero and it is feared that the fruit spared from the preceding week was killed by last week-end's "spring-like" weather. Since then it has been gradually warming up and we are again in hopes that spring is here to stay.

Inspector Looks Over Forest Ave. Grade Crossing. Visit Due to Reporter Editorial Several Weeks ago—Prospect of a Better Pavement. An inspector from the Burlington was here Monday afternoon to look over the Forest avenue grade crossing and make a report on its condition to headquarters. His visit here was due to a Reporter editorial on this subject printed in the issue of April 8th, calling attention to the bumps which the motorist is forced to endure while crossing this short stretch of tracks. The editorial was called to the attention of an official and the visit of the inspector followed. We are in hopes that this inspection will be speedily followed by a gang of men armed with an order to repair the holes in this "bump the bumps."
