

**HENRY G. CLARK
TALKED AT P.-T.
ASS'N. MEETING**

One of the Ten Chicago District Superintendents Gave Interesting Address Thursday

Henry G. Clark who is one of the ten District Superintendents of the educational system of the city of Chicago, gave a very interesting talk last Thursday evening before the Parent-Teacher Association at their regular meeting in the high school assembly. Mr. Clark has charge of the district between Western avenue and Halsted street and Chicago avenue and Sixteenth street. Under him are many teachers drilling the three "R's" into more than 30,000 pupils of all grades and all nationalities. Included in the territory is part of the more densely populated sections of the city and the problems to be met and solved are many and varied.

Mr. Clark has served in the school system of Chicago in various capacities for more than twenty-five years.

He talked last Thursday evening for an hour and so interesting were the things he told that not one moment did the interest lag. His experiences have been many and his manner of telling about them held his hearers. Among other things he told of the shortage of teachers, saying Chicago needs 500 more right now.

Explaining the finances of the system, he said that the city is running behind in the school fund alone, a matter of a half million dollars a month.

There was only one trouble with the meeting and that was that not more people could have been present to hear this talk on education given by a man who is a leader in the field and understands whereof he speaks.
